**Memorial Service Held at Cornwall**

A simple, but impressive war memorial service was held on Sunday last at Cornwall, in the vicinity of the Soldier's Monument, the base of which was appropriately decorated with flowers and a large number of people turned out. Mr. George Crews, of Cornwall presided at the service, which consisted of the singing of hymns, led by church choir members, and short addresses. The speakers were Mr. Justice Arsenault, Rev. Dr. Genge, and Rev. Mr. Millet.

Mr. Justice Arsenault referred to his recent visit to the battlefields and assured his hearers that the boys in whose honor our monuments here are erected, are not forgotten in France and Flanders. He said that the monuments, with their own deadstone and beautiful with fresh flowers. He regretted that owing to the great extent of the war area and the short time at his disposal it was possible for him to visit only a few Canadian cemeteries.

Standing in the cemetery a V. M. J., gazing upon the graves of our heroic dead and thinking of a sacrifice they made, the question came to his mind whether, after all, the world has yet learned the lesson of the war. Certainly the international affairs today are far from being settled. In France, he regretted to find a prevailing sentiment of unfaith in what is being done to establish world peace; they seem to be impressed with the doctrine that Germany considers herself not yet defeated and that a spirit of revenge is lurking there, which may again plunge Europe into bloodshed. Let us hope that France is mistaken, that Germany is sincere in her proposals and that the world delegates assembled at the peace conference at Geneva will successfully find a means of averting another war!

The speaker believed that the cause of so much discord through out the world today is that nations and individuals are not following the charitable precept, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Wars are caused through the failure of people to realize this; by their efforts to impose their will on others, and when they cannot do that peacefully, to attempt it by force of arms.

While visiting the house of Deputies in Paris the speaker was impressed with the fourth article of the French Constitution guaranteeing liberty to every individual of the nation, to do whatever that individual wishes, so long as he did not interfere with the liberty of his fellow subject. This is the great truth which nations as well as individuals should grasp. Let us mind our own business; do what we like within our own limits as a nation, but let us not interfere with the liberty of our neighbors. Let Germany do this instead of breaking faith with other nations and ruthlessly tramping down little nations, there would probably never have been a world war.

The speaker had no patience with those who today are trying to raise their heads by harping on the mistakes made during the war. Let us forget them. What we should remember is the lesson of universal charity; it is boys whose memory is honored in these monuments could speak to us, they would urge us to be olive and let live, to go to others, in individuality, as a community and as a nation, what we would have them do to us. Let us as Canadians forget racial and religious differences, which resenting with the individual, as in our dealings with each other every man for what he is, irrespective of anything that comes his own conscience. If we practice charity as individuals it will as a matter of course become national virtue; and if nations aim that great lesson, we will have no future wars, and the world will draw nearer to the ideal kingdom of Christ.

Concluding, Judge Arsenault quoted the sentiment of the great religious parol and theologian, Cardinal Mercier, that we need have no anxieties about our heroes who gave their lives for freedom, and who now are wearing the martyr's crown.

Rev. Dr. Genge, of the Christian Church, Charlottetown, emphasized the achievement of Canada's sons in the war in helping to raise Canada from the status of a Dominion to that of an Imperial power. Favorably situated as we are geographically and climatically, we cannot become great except through the individual deeds and merits of our people. We have made a distinct step forward in recent years through the suffering and sacrifice of the War.

paid by our gallant sons, we have today, in the Parliament of Nations, an Imperial voice in the determining of future war and peace.

Like the Israelites of old, with their monuments of stone looking eastward, our children's children will ask: What mean ye by these monuments. And they will be told the story of the Canadian contingents in the war, and of the great price paid for victory. We may not understand the full measure of their suffering, but we will know that the sacrifice was made.

It is ours to hold high the torch which they kindled who fell in France and Flanders, Canada, the speaker believed, is destined to grow from strength to strength, and to become a great power in the world; but it must ever be through heroic efforts, in peace as in war.

Rev. Mr. Millet spoke briefly in conclusion, urging that while remembering our heroic dead, we must not forget those who returned, some of whom may be in dire want during the year to come. This he expressed effectively in poetic form, quoting a line he had composed in France during the war. The service closed with the National Anthem.
