Owing to unseasonably inclement weather the week-day services were not large. On Saturday morning after the announcements the pastor called on Miss Katie MacEachern who came forward and in her usual capable manner addressed the congregation for a few moments. Rev. Mr. Wadland made a very fitting reply which carried a deep note of reverence when thanking Miss MacEachern for her kind remarks and the congregation in general for this very lovely gift hoping he would always prove worthy of same. On Sunday morning the Sacrament was dispensed by the pastor assisted by the elders, the silence during this time being much appreciated by everybody and added greatly to the solemnity of the occasion. Another much enjoyed feature was the singing of the communion hymn without music which brought back to many the services of long ago that were enjoyed by the pioneers of our church that are gone but not forgotten. One new member was received on profession of faith and the sacrament of baptism was postponed owing to the weather that made it impossible to take the little ones out.

Girl Guide Commissioner's Annual Report

The following is the report of Mrs. John Y. Reay, Provincial Commissioner of the Girl Guides Association, delivered at the annual meeting held at Government House.

I have pleasure in submitting the 3rd annual Provincial Report for the year ending November 1st.

As you may have guessed from the District Commissioner's report, Prince Edward Island has forged ahead during the past year. Besides the new companies and packs in Charlottetown, Prince County has contributed new Guide Companies in Summerside, Kensington and Tyne Valley with St. Eleanor's as a prospect. This growth in the western part of the Island is largely due to the enterprising work of Mrs. Hart-Davies, Division Commissioner for Prince. Our total enrollment to date is now over 700, divided among 30 units, representing an increase of about 70% over last year's membership. If we keep on increasing at this rate for another year we should reach our objective which is a membership of 1,000.

The members of the Provincial Executive have been forced most reluctantly to accept the resignation of Mrs. Hart-Davies who has given us a year of most valuable experience to further the cause of Guiding, not only in Prince County but all over the Island.

This leaves us without Commissioners in Prince and Kings Counties. I speak for the Provincial Executive when I say that we would be most grateful for suggestions of names for Commissioners in these counties. Queen County is most fortunate in having Miss Gillan and we are all glad to welcome back into our ranks, Miss Mary McNutt as District Commissioner for Charlottetown. Kings County has never had a Commissioner, consequently the companies in Montague and Murray River are finding it increasingly difficult to carry on.

Post Guiding is now established in the province under Mrs. Harris's capable supervision. You will hear her report later. Lone Guiding unfortunately has suffered a temporary setback owing to the illness of the Captain, Miss Dorothy Reay. Miss Reay, however expects to take up the work again in the near future. There should be a wide field for Lone Guiding in P. E. I., to be eligible one only has to live in a place where there is no Guide Company. Mrs. Harris who is Secretary also for Lones would be glad to get names of these isolated girls.

Besides Commissioners we need Guiders, and our Guiders need training and for training we need money.

In order to raise funds for organizing purposes the Provincial Council sponsored a Telephone Bridge of 88 tables which was most successful. In February, through the kindness of our Honorary President a delightful skating party was held at Government House. The Skate was postponed from the only night during the winter which was too cold for skating to the only night when we could have had our party. Delicious refreshments were provided for 125 guests. His Honour very kindly offered us the use of the rink again, but alas! weather did not permit our taking advantage of the offer. In October of this year Mrs. W. S. Stewart kindly lent us her rooms for a most enjoyable Bridge of 20 tables.

On Thinking Day, the joint birthday of the Chief Guide and Chief Scout, Guides, Rangers and Brownies in the province were asked to co-operate with the Boy Scouts in wearing their uniforms all day.

The Provincial Council again donated Company and individual prizes for a successful Handicraft Competition for which eleven Companies sent in 52 entries of knitting, hooking, sewing, drawing, etc.

As mentioned in the report of the President of the Local Association the Melville Guide Company won the Challenge Shield and Nature donated by Her Excellency the Countess of Bessborough. The Melville Guides deserve much credit for the way they carry on not only Company meetings but outside activities to raise funds for Company equipment.

In April we said "Bon Voyage" to Miss Wilson and Constance Hyndman who represented the province at the Coronation in England. We are to have the pleasure of hearing more about it from Miss Wilson this afternoon.

The great majority of us being unable to travel, celebrated the Coronation of their gracious Majesties in a way becoming to Girl Guides. Miss McNutt has mentioned the Church Parade and the Coronation Day Parade but I am going to enlarge a little on her report.

The success of the Guide Coronation activities was almost entirely due to the wonderful co-operation of the Guiders headed by Miss Fullerton, District Captain. Owing to inclement weather on the day of the Church Parade, the Guides were unable to parade from the Square. However, arrangements were changed and the large turnout of Guiders and Brownies walked from Hall to Church without a hitch in the program.

The Coronation Day Parade was a triumph, again the Guiders should have the credit. I think every Guide in Charlottetown turned out for the occasion, each company carrying its colors, with the Rangers from Charlottetown, and Dunstaffnage, Marshfield bringing up the rear.

After the Parade most of the home, on times, innumerable we

I regret that I was unable to officially inspect the Camps but was glad of the opportunity of paying a short visit one evening, being driven to Brudenell by three members of the S.P.C.A. who spoke to the Campers on the work of the Society. The Guides were pleased to be able to assist the S.P.C.A. by serving at their booth at their Provincial Exhibition.

In September, His Excellency Lord Tweedsmuir paid a visit to the province and was pleased to inspect the Girl Guides of Charlottetown. The Governor General remarked particularly on the wonderful turn-out of Guides and on the smartness of their uniforms.

Another outstanding event this autumn was National Guide Day, observed by Guides all over Canada in a spirit of fellowship and service. In Charlottetown a "Guides' Own Twilight Service" was held at St. James Church for the Protestant Guides and a special service was held in the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer for girls of the Roman Catholic faith. Following these services the Guides went to three different centres for supper after which everyone gathered in Harts Hall for a hearty sing-song which closed in time for the Guides to Listen to the coast to coast broadcast on Guide Day.

Brownies of Charlottetown observed this day in a spirit of service to others. They visited the two orphanages and other institutions taking with them donations of food and magazines.

In closing I should like on behalf of myself and the Provincial Council to express my thanks to His Honour the Lieut. Governor and Mrs. DeBlois for their interest in Guiding and particularly for the use of Government House Rink for the Skating Party and for this meeting.

Our thanks are due also to the Press for carrying the Guide News Column and for their co-operation to the Red Cross Society for harbouring the Provincial Headquarters Office and for the frequent use of their rooms for meetings, etc., and to all who have helped with Guiding and contributed financially.

Before closing I must pay tribute to all the Guiders of the province, both in Charlottetown and out of town for their wonderful loyalty and enthusiasm, also to my fellow Commissioners and to the Provincial Council with a special word for Miss Wilson who never spares herself in any good cause.

This is Peace Action Week in Canada, Guiding stands for Peace and better citizenship. If Guides and Guiders alike would put the same wonderful enthusiasm and co-operation into furthering the cause of Peace that they do into Guiding then truly Guiding can be called a Junior League of Nations.
