**FORMER ISLANDER.**—Word has been received here of the death of Henry Forsythe, elder son of Rev. F. H. Larkin, B. A., B. D., Seaforth, Ont. He went with the first contingent to England but was returned invalided. He died on the 7th Jan. and funeral took place from Manse on 10th. He leaves to mourn besides his father and mother, three sisters and one brother—Helen, musical instructor in Westminster College, Toronto; Frederick R., now training for overseas service at Kingston; Marion and Beatrice at home. Rev. F. H. and Mrs. Larkin are both natives of Alberta and have many friends and relatives throughout the Island.

**LOBSTERS.**—The following report of the market from the Halifax Herald will be of general interest:—The winter catch can usually be considered to have been obtained within a period of three or four weeks and the size of the winter pack can be gauged within that period. Early storms have wrought havoc with the gear of the fishermen in some districts, so that they have been forced to desist. Ruling prices for the season have given the fishermen about 12 cent per pound more for their small fish than last summer and packers from \$1 to \$2 more a case than last season. Exporters are at present unwilling to commit themselves as to the continuation of this state of affairs for the spring pack.

**AN ENTHUSIASTIC FOXMAN.**—Mr. H. J. Morrison, who has been a guest of Mr. Percy Tanton, crossed by the steamer Stanley yesterday en route to Winnipeg. Mr. Morrison was connected with the Electric Light Co. of Summerside for some years and went West thirteen years ago. He notes a marked improvement in the town along many lines. Mr. Morrison has been in close touch with the fox farming industry in Northern British Columbia as well as in this province, and seldom is there a visitor from abroad who is as optimistic as he is in this business. He states: "I am perplexed to learn that the majority of island fox farmers who have realized easy cash from this industry have at this time of European war and stringent money taken cold feet. My advice to them is to take fresh courage, and instead of allowing the broker to sell their breeders, purchase more. Now is the time to buy, not when animals are boosted to \$10,000 per pair. At present prices they can find no better investment than P. E. Island Standard-bred foxes. I predict that we will never see better prices for the purchaser, and further, that before 1917 we will pay \$2,500 for Standard-bred foxes instead of \$1,000 per pair, (today's prices).
