The Halifax Merchant says: The P.
 E. I. produce market is now well
 supplied. There have been many ar-
 rivals of late. In one day last week,
 nine vessels arrived from Island ports
 bringing with them the largest ship-
 ments of the season, namely 23,546
 bushels of potatoes, 5,709 bushels of
 oats and 2,403 bushels of turnips.
 The demand for potatoes is very ac-
 tive just now, but the supply is so
 large that prices are very low. We
 have heard of as small a quantity
 as ten to twenty bushels selling for
 thirty cents per bushel, which is quoted
 as the ruling price. Oats are
 plentiful, but not in good demand at
 present, the price being forty seven
 to forty eight cents per bushel. Turn-
 ips sell at twenty five cents per
 bushel.

Last Monday evening J. Henderson
 Lawson, station agent of the C. N.
 R. at Giroux, Me., arrived in this
 Province accompanying the body of
 his father, the late David A. Lawson,
 who died at Giroux on November 3rd,
 while on a visit to the former's home.
 Mr. Lawson, who has been station
 agent at Georgetown since July last
 complained of losing weight on the
 journey, but otherwise appeared to be
 in good health. On the 29th he took
 very ill, complaining of excessive
 thirst and two doctors were called in.
 They pronounced the malady Bright's
 disease. Mr. Lawson rapidly sank, de-
 ceasing all that medical skill could do,
 and five days after his arrival he pas-
 sed away. His death was not only a
 great shock to his son, who had
 planned to take his vacation and ac-
 company his father on a trip through
 Western Canada, but it came as a ter-
 rible blow to his wife and family at
 Georgetown. At Royalton Junction on
 Monday night a special train met the
 express, taking the body to George-
 town. Tuesday a special funeral train
 left Georgetown for Pothia Station
 carriages were in waiting and the
 body was taken to Belfast Church,
 where a most solemn and impressive
 service was held, at which eloquent
 addresses were delivered by Rev. S.
 D. McPhee and Rev. T. F. Fullerton.
 The burial took place in the ceme-
 tery close by the church, the services
 being conducted by the members of
 the Masonic Order, to which the de-
 ceased belonged. Mr. Lawson was
 also a member of the Foresters, and
 the pall-bearers were selected from
 that Order to accompany the body
 from his late residence in George-
 town to the station. The pall-bearers
 at Belfast were Alexander McDon-
 ald, Charlottetown, Allan McDonald,
 John Stewart, John Dalziel, of
 Georgetown, all of the P. E. I. R.;
 Elmer Jenkins, Georgetown, and
 Murdoch McInnis, St. Peter's. Many
 beautiful floral tributes attested to
 the deep sympathy extended to the
 bereaved family in their affliction.
 The late Mr. Lawson leaves a widow,
 formerly Miss Smith of Belfast, at
 whose desire the body was interred
 at that place; one son, J. Henderson,
 and two daughters, Georgie, teacher
 at the Georgetown School, and Eula-
 lia also in Georgetown.

 make the bazaar a success.

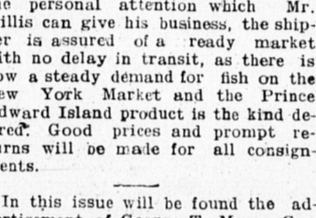

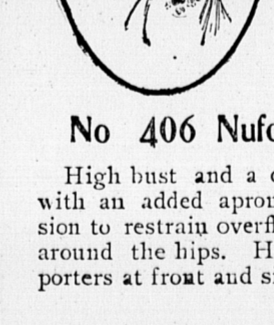
