BRITAIN AND JAPAN'S TREATY WILL BE STRENGTHENED.

The Understanding of the Former with France Mitigated Friction During the War—Liberals Will Welcome the Policy.

LONDON, June 8.—Lord Lansdowne, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, made a speech the other day, which taken in conjunction with the one made yesterday by Sir Edward Grey, in which he said the Liberal party keenly realized the obligation of maintaining the Anglo-Japanese alliance, makes it practically clear that the government, which ever party is in power, when the time for the renewal of the treaty arrives, will so strengthen it as to establish virtually a complete alliance. Lord Lansdowne referred approvingly to Sir Edward's speech. He said there had been no time, either on the part of Japan or Great Britain, any question whatever of withdrawal from the alliance. He added: "I may venture further to say that in our opinion, when the time comes to consider a renewal of the agreement, the only practical question will be whether it shall be renewed in its present form or whether we should not seek some means of strengthening and consolidating it. The alliance has been a potent instrument for peace, and if it should prove possible to modify it that it should not only prevent the spread of a conflagration when a conflagration has begun, but prevent a conflagration taking place at all, I believe that all lovers of peace would rejoice at such a consummation."
