ONE-GUN WARSHIPS.

It is not likely that Mr. Churchill and the Lords of the Admiralty will lose much sleep on account of the latest naval bogey, which, according to the Engineer, is designed to be Germany's trump card when that great day comes which is a standing toast in the wardrooms of her navy. From the somewhat sketchy description given, this terrible vessel would appear to be nothing more than a reincarnation, if such a word can be applied to a thing of steel and steam, of the celebrated "monitor" idea with which that enterprising Swede, John Ericsson, baffled the sailors of the American Confederacy in 1862.

Except that they had no pretensions to speed, Ericsson's monitors were almost identical with the new type of warship. They were armoured over the entire hull, even the funnel of the ventilating pipes being protected. They carried only two guns in their single heavily plated turrets, but these guns were by far the most powerful weapons which up to that time had been mounted on the open deck of a ship. They were low on the water, having a freeboard of about three feet or less, and only the turret and conning tower were offered as a mark to the guns of an enemy. Their guns were completely screened, except at the moment of firing, by iron port-shutters which closed automatically when the weapon recoiled after being discharged.

ONLY FIT FOR SMOOTH WATER.

Now what did these monitors accomplish? When fighting in rivers and land-locked waters they were formidable enough, but on the open sea they were almost unmanageable. They could not fight their guns, for every wave practically submerged them turret and all, and if the weather was rough they were unable to steam either, for the sea poured down their funnels and extinguished the fires. They met the needs of a war waged most on inland waters, but the idea was not taken up by Great Britain or any of the leading European navies, and, their task being accomplished, the monitors became as obsolete as Nelson's "wooden walls." The new type is spoken of as being "speedier than any Dreadnought," and "able to keep the sea in all weathers." Does anyone suppose that if it were possible to construct a seaworthy armoured vessel which combined the advantages of high speed and a powerful armament with what is perhaps, the chief problem of modern naval construction—the pre-emption of a minimum vulnerable surface to an opponent's guns—the great ship designers of all countries would continue to place the guns on their vessels as high as possible above the water line? Why should modern battleships be made good targets by giving them higher sides than can be covered by their armoured belts? Why expand vast sums on monster vessels if smaller ones can be built which would be equally
