Free Trader Will Oppose Bonar Law

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—When Mr Bonar Law, the new premier-designate of Great Britain stands for re-election in the near future, he will be opposed by Sir George Paish, one of England's widely known bankers and financial advisers to the British Government during the first two years of the world war. Sir George announced his intention of running against Mr. Bonar Law on his arrival here from England yesterday, he predicted that the Conservative Government would attempt to raise a high protective tariff barrier. "It is as a Free Trader that I am to stand for the House of Commons against Mr Bonar Law," Paish said, "the victory of the Conservatives would cause England to become a protectionist country. I believe that a protective tariff would be disastrous to Great Britain. Just now I believe it is essential to take down the barriers to trade in the Empire and in the entire world."

Bonar Law Hints At Early Election

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Premier designate Bonar Law in a message to the newspapers this afternoon says: "If I am elected the leader of the Conservative party I may be in a position to advise the King to order immediately the dissolution of parliament and this would give plenty of time to get the Irish home rule bill through."

All War Medals Have Been Issued

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—Practically all war medals have now been received at militia headquarters here and the last shipment of 11,000 arrived on October 11th. The issue of medals commenced in February 1921, and up to the present 237,888 British war medals and 221,713 Victory medals have been despatched and of this number 9,046 British war medals and 8,435 Victory medals have been returned undelivered due to change of address.

Strong Criticism of British Exhibition

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Mr. Robert Donald, in a statement yesterday to the Montreal Star, says that Canada has the whiphand in not yet being pledged to the British Empire exhibition. "She should make her participation on the definite condition that imperial supplies only are used for catering, building and fencing requirements before she promises a dollar," he said, he has protested now because there is still time to save the situation before 1924 when the exhibition is to be held. He estimates that there will be ten million visitors to the exhibition during six months, one million might require meals other than tea and drinks, and Mr. Donald points to the absurdity of the idea that the British Empire is unable to feed five thousand daily. "The weak element in the exhibition," he declared "the decision lay with the chairman, Sir Henry McMahon a man unknown to the Empire outside India and Egypt, Sir Francis Stoll, of the modern hotels professional restaurateur, James Bramley, Labor official and Free Trader, and three civil servants representing the India office, the Crown Colonies and the Board of Trade. They should not be allowed to vote on the question of Imperial Policy."

Colonel Pinkham seconded Mr. Donald's motion, but deserted to the majority. His protest was largely based on reports cabled from Australia and New Zealand by Major Belcher, an exhibition emissary who obtained financial pledges of \$250,000 from those dominions on the assumption that only Empire and Dominion produce were to be used.

Lord Curzon May Retain Foreign Secretaryship

LONDON, Oct. 21.—It is generally accepted that Lord Curzon will remain secretary for foreign affairs in the new cabinet and thus will represent Great Britain at the Turkish peace conference for which he is continuing to arrange the preliminaries.

With the exception of the few stones cut in Antwerp, all the rough diamonds of the world are cut in Amsterdam. There the diamond-cutting business is carried on in between 70 and 80 establishments, which give employment to 12,000 cutters, that is, in normal times. The first cutting of a diamond was accomplished something like 450 years ago, says the Kansas City Star. The ancients knew nothing of the hidden beauty of the stone, called by Seneca, "The sage whose impassability nothing can conquer." But, even in the rough, the diamond won the favor of princes, and, very gradually, experiments revealed some of its fires. Until the Fourteenth century enamelled buttons were the chief articles of jewelry. low as to bring the decorated buttons within the reach of all purses, enameling lost the favor of the fine world, and buttons of gold and silver, ornamented with pearls, diamonds and colored stones took the place of the enamels. The finest of the stones then known as a diamond—A formless mass the size of a pigeon's egg—was a gem worn on great occasions by the king of Portugal. In the year 1470, when Bruges was a residence city, the court lived a life of extravagant luxury. Men and women went about in garments stiff with gold and silver ornaments, and sewed over with pearls and precious stones. But the stones were uncut and shapeless. Charles, son of the duke of Normandy, owned a great diamond, which he adorned himself by exhibiting to his "chaperon"; but, as he declared it in the beginning of that century, virtue, he bewailed its shape and when the price of enamel fell so its lack of light.

At that time one of the important jewel merchants of Bruges was served by a clerk who was a native of Flanders—a young man named Louis de Berquem, who was deep in hopeless love of his master's daughter. All day he did the bidding of his master; all night he sat at a rough bench in his attic trying to make some impression, on a stone rot upon the ground. During the
