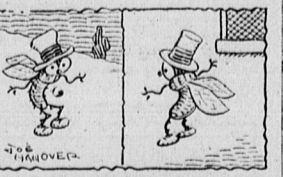

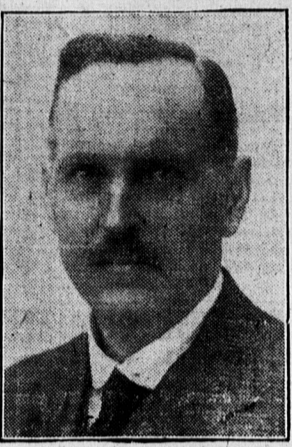

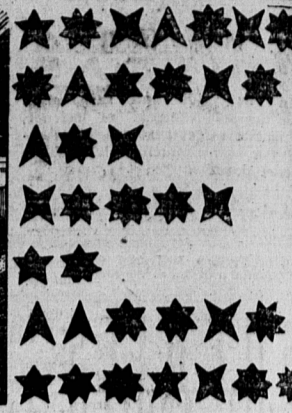
How He Did It
