**China's Air Force Goes On Offensive**

CHUNKING, June 29.—(AP)—Flots of China's fledgling air force, flying under the tutelage of veteran American volunteer airmen, in their first offensive activity in nearly five years of war have sunk two Japanese warships in the Yangtze and inflicted enormous losses upon enemy ground forces in eastern Kiangsi, the Chinese announced today.

**ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, June 29.—(Monday)—**(CP)—Allied bombers have made a prolonged raid on Japanese troop dispositions Lae and Salamaua on the island of New Guinea northeast of Australia, Allied Headquarters announced today.  
**MADRID, June 28.—(AP)—**The Spanish news agency, E.F.E., today circulated a report of its New York correspondent saying that "North American" troops now are facing the Axis Egyptian offensive alongside British Empire forces.  
**MOSCOW, June 29.—(Monday)—**(AP)—Saboteurs at work in Germany have derailed two fully loaded trains, killing many persons, the Moscow radio said today, quoting Stockholm reports.  
**The wrecks were said to have occurred in the eastern part of Germany.**  
**NASSAU, Bahamas, June 28.—**(CP)—The Duke of Windsor joined fire-fighters today in combating a \$1,000,000 blaze which destroyed nearly a block of the Nassau business section.

lin radio confirmed that Bremen was the main target but—as usual—contended that only residential areas suffered.

As at Cologne and Essen, these accounts said Thursday night's 1,000-odd plane attack on Bremen left great factories in ruins. Saturday night's attack there thus followed the now familiar R. A. F. pattern of a second potent hammering designed as a "coup de grace."

One German newspaper reaching Stockholm, the Rheinisch Westfälische Zeitung, carried a notice from Dr. Albert Speer, minister of munitions and general director of building, that many factories had been so badly damaged in German cities that local facilities were unable to make repairs.

Speer said that special commissions had been appointed to determine which industries and "in what measure it is reasonable to attempt repairs."

Was industries in and around Cologne suffered "enormous damage," Speer said. At Bremen, he recounted "large destruction" was inflicted upon shipbuilding yards, the big Focke-Wulf aircraft plant and harbor structures.

Another Nazi newspaper reaching Stockholm, the National Zeitung of Essen, reported a state of affairs verging on "criminal neglect" among civilian and air raid precaution services. It said that even such measures as storing sufficient water and pumps and other fire-fighting equipment were "in a deplorable state."

It was learned Saturday that a large vanguard of the United States Army Air Corps is established in the British Isles and is making preparations at a secret base to bomb Germany soon in mass attacks co-ordinated with those of the R.A.F.

### Pale Serenity of Pearls Loved By Famed Beauties

The portraits of the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries afford us many interesting evidences regarding the various forms of jewellery in which pearls were used. As we turn with increasing frequency to these periods for our fashion inspiration, not only in designing clothes but in jewel design, it is interesting to check through a few of the portraits from the 15th into the early 17th centuries—to note how pearls were used, not only as a personal decoration but as a costume decoration.

Quite unique is the pearl decoration in a picture of St. Barbara, painted by an artist of the French school, and dated 1520, which is in the National museum of Budapest. This artist uses pearls with the utmost severity of taste and richness.

Catherine de Medici wore two rows of pearls on her bonnet and a quaint necklace in sections of two rows of four pearls with a large pearl between; a pear-shaped pendant on a Renaissance jewel; a necklace of pearls connected with each other by a large oval pearl. The necklace, which hangs down over the bosom, is fastened by a clasp in the form of a four-leaved clover, from which depend two other sections similar to those described above, and terminating in an oval pearl pendant.

A crayon sketch of Françoise de Foix, Comtesse de Chateaubriant (1490-1537), who became the mistress of Francis I, shows her wearing a hood or coil ornamented with forty oval pearls. She also wears a necklace of sixty fine round pearls.

Diane de Poitiers (1490-1566), granddaughter of Charles VII and Agnes Sorel, is represented with a headdress similar to that worn by the Comtesse de Chateaubriant. It has a border of sixty round pearls. This crayon is of the time of Jean Clouet.

A portrait of Philip Strozzi (1541-1592) who, although an Italian, had the rank of colonel-general in the French army, is interesting as an illustration of the wearing of a cor-

where.)  
"During June 28, in the Kursk direction, fighting continued with the German troops who had gone over to the offensive," the Soviet bureau of information said in its Sunday midnight communique announcing the new outbreak of fighting.

As the siege of Sevastopol went into its 25th day, the Russians declared that the "historic defenders" of that town Crimean port "are repulsing furious enemy attacks," attacking bravely in several areas and forcing the Germans to retreat.

Dispatches said the Russians, with tanks, guns, planes and even an armored train, slashed at the new enemy lines jutting out from Kharkov and that the horizon was black with the smoke of burning German tanks.

The German offensive against Sevastopol also was reported to have worn down to the artillery shelling of the south side of the Black Sea naval base and to ineffective infantry assaults on the north side.

The dispatches from the front indicated the Red army was concentrating on draining enemy strength after fighting the Germans to a standstill and to be stabilizing positions both in the Ukraine and the Crimea.

The strong counter-attack, supported by tanks, was reported to have rolled the Germans back with great losses of men and machines in one Ukrainian sector. At another point, the advances said the Germans were pushed back from a river where they attempted to force a crossing.

**Reds Stage Ambush**  
Red army tank forces reported they had staged a successful ambush on the west bank of the river, turning back a column of 50 German tanks and killing more than 500 German infantrymen.

(Evidently this was the Oskol River, just west of Kupyansk, about 60 miles east southeast of Kharkov.)
