ENTENTE GOVERNMENTS' REPLY TO PRESIDENT WILSON'S NOTE

(Continued from Page One.)

questions put by the American government and, according to the exact words of the letter constitute a public declaration as to the conditions upon which the war could be terminated.

REPLY TO QUESTION AS TO OBJECTS SOUGHT IN CONTINUING THE WAR

President Wilson desires more, he desires that the belligerent powers openly affirm the objects which they seek by continuing the war.

The Allies experience no difficulty in replying to the request.

Their objects in the war are well known. They have been formulated on many occasions by the chiefs of their divers governments. Their objects in the war will not be made known in detail with all the equitable compensations and indemnities for damages suffered, until the hour of negotiation. But the civilized world knows that they imply in all necessity and in the first instance, the restoration of Belgium, of Serbia, and of Montenegro, and the indemnities which are due them; the evacuation of the invaded territories of France, Russia and Roumania, with just reparation; the re-organization of Europe, guaranteed by a stable settlement based alike upon the principle of nationalities, upon the right which all powers, whether small or great, have to the enjoyment of full security

and free economic development, and also upon territorial agreement and international arrangements so framed as to guarantee land and sea frontiers against unjust attacks; the restitution of provinces of the territories wrested in the past from the Allies by force or against the will of their populations; the liberation of Italians, of Slavs, of Roumanians, and Tcheco-Slov-aques from foreign domination; the enfranchisement of populations subject to the bloody tyranny of the Turks; the expulsion from Europe of the Ottoman Empire which has proved itself so radically alien to western civilization.

RUSSIA HAS ANSWERED FOR HERSELF

The intentions of His Majesty the Emperor of Russia regarding Poland have been clearly indicated in the proclamation which he has just addressed to his armies. It goes without saying that if the Allies wish to liberate Europe from the brutal covetousness of Prussian militarism it never has been their design, as has been alleged, to encompass the extermination of the German peoples and their political disappearance. That which they desire above all is to insure a peace upon the principle of liberty and justice, upon the invaluable fidelity to international obligation with which the government of the United States has never ceased to be inspired.

Allies Unitedly Determined to Bring War to Victorious Close.

United in the pursuit of this supreme object the Allies are determined individually and collectively to act with all their power and to consent to all sacrifices to bring to a victorious close a conflict upon which they are convinced not only their own safety and prosperity depends, but also the future of civilization itself.

BELGIAN NOTE

The translation of the Belgian note which was handed to Ambassador Sharp with the Entente reply, follows: The government of the King which has associated itself with the answer handed by the President of the French council to the American Ambassador on behalf of all is particularly desirous of paying tribute to the sentiment of humanity which prompted the President of the United States to send his note to the belligerent powers, and it highly esteems the friendship expressed for Belgium through his kindly intermediation.

President's Assumption Disproved by Belgium.

It desires as much as Mr. Woodrow Wilson to see the present war end as early as possible. But the President seems to believe that the statesmen of the two opposing camps pursue the same objects of war. The example of Belgium unfortunately demonstrates that this is in no wise the fact.

German Barbarism Towards Belgium.

Belgium has never, like the Central Powers, aimed at conquest. The barbarous fashion in which the German government has treated and is still treating the Belgian nation does not permit the supposition that Germany will pre-occupy herself with guaranteeing in the future the rights of weak nations which she has not ceased to trample under foot since the war left loose by her began to desolate Europe.

On the other hand the government of the King has noted with pleasure and with confidence the assurances that the United States is impatient to co-operate in the measures which will be taken after the conclusion of peace to protect and guarantee the small nations against violence and oppression.

Belgium Had Aspired to Live on Good Terms With Neighbors.

Previous to the German ultimatum Belgium only aspired to live upon good terms with all her neighbors. She practised with scrupulous loyalty towards each one of them the duties imposed by her neutrality.

Germany Admitted Violation of Neutrality in the same manner has she been

rewarded by Germany for the confidence she placed in her, through which from one day to the other, without any plausible reason, her neutrality was violated and the Chancellor of the Empire when announcing to the Reichstag this violation of right and treaties was obliged to recognize the iniquity of such an act and predetermined that it would be repaired, but the Germans after the occupation of Belgian territory have displayed not better observance of the rules of international law or the stipulations of The Hague Convention.

How Germans Ruined Belgium.

They have by taxation as heavy as it is arbitrary drained the resources of the country. They have intentionally ruined industries, destroyed whole cities and put to death and imprisoned a considerable number of its inhabitants. Even now while they are loudly proclaiming their desire to put an end to the horrors of war they increase the rigors of the occupation by deporting into servitude Belgian workers by the thousands.

Will Accept Peace Only With Reparation and Guarantees for the Future.

Compelled to fight or to submit to shame she passionately desires that an end be brought to the unprecedented sufferings of her population, but she could only accept a peace which would assure her as well, equitable reparation, security and guarantees for the future. The American people since the beginning of the war have manifested for the oppressed Belgian nation its most ardent sympathy. It is an American commission for relief in Belgium which, in close union with the government of the King and the national committee, displays an untiring devotion and marvellous activity in revictualing Belgium.

Belgian Gratitude to the United States

The government of the King is happy to avail itself of this opportunity to express its profound gratitude to the Commission for Relief as well as to the generous Americans eager to relieve the misery of the Belgian population.

Finally, nowhere more than in the United States, have the abductions and deportations of Belgian civilians provoked such a spontaneous movement of protestation and indignant reproof. The facts entirely to the honor of the American nation, allow the government of the King to entertain the legitimate hope that at the time of the definite settlement of this long war the voice of the Entente Powers will find in the United States a unanimous echo to claim in favor of the Belgian nation, the innocent victim of German ambition and covetousness, the rank and place which it is entitled to.
