## ISLAND SNIPER WINNER AT DOMINION MEET Favorites Advance In Tennis; Upset Features Golf

### Few Upsets As Ranking Canadian Net Stars Lead Parade To Final Stages

Continuing their accurate firing after a deluge of rain had prevented play in the morning, favored Eastern Canadian tennis stars yesterday advanced all along the front as the matches narrowed down to the eights in the men's singles and to the semi-finals in the women's singles.

Brilliant tennis that had large galleries applauding almost continuously saw all the seeded players in men's singles advance yesterday in rather easy fashion over less experienced opponents, but the women's singles provided another upset when Isobel Matheson, seeded player fell before the smooth accurate stroking of Mrs. Ross Harrington of Bridgewater, N. S.

Highlights of yesterday's men's singles was the match between Gordon Bauld of Halifax and Edgar Murphy of Ottawa. This match produced a spectacular brand of tennis and although Murphy won in straight sets by scores of 6-2, 6-3, the young Halifax star forced the Ottawa player to the limit in every one of the 17 games played.

Feature of the mixed doubles event was the match between Juliette Dugal of Quebec and Don Robinson of Moncton versus Kay Doyle of Halifax and Eric Woodworth of Halifax. It was another straight set victory with Dugal and Robinson being returned the winners by scores of 6-3, 7-5, but not before the fans had witnessed thrilling rallies and brilliant returns in every game of the match.

### MacDonald-Brier Match, Shot Under Difficult Conditions, Won By Capt. James Coles

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, Ont., Aug. 11—Undisturbed by a heavy rainstorm, Capt. James Coles, M.M. of Winsloe Station, P. E. I., today won the MacDonald's Brier Match, second only to the Governor General's final for toughness, at the annual meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

Most of Canada's best sharpshooters were irked by the rain, but the Maritime sniper plugged along cautiously to compile a score of 123 points, two short of a possible, over 300 and 600 yards. He was awarded first prize money and a silver medal.

With the rain falling heavily Capt. Coles went to the 300-yard firing mounds and found his aim at its best. He spanked 10 bullets targetward, tagged for bull's eyes. He didn't fall at 600 yards when the rain eased somewhat. He scored 73 of a possible 75 for a total score of 123. The only shot to swerve from the bull's eye were his eighth and 13th and they went for inners.
