Japan Gathers Warlike Stores

Information has come to hand that in spite of the Pacific pact, that the Japanese have not stopped their accumulation of munitions and warlike stores. Some months ago the despatches told how they had been buying wheat heavily in the Australian market. These purchases are still continuing and it is stated by the London Grain Market that by the end of June they will have purchased over 1,000,000 tons all of which was transported in their own ships.

DiOrganizes Shipping Market

This has disorganized the London shipping market which is usually busy about this time arranging charters to carry grain to Europe from Australia. The Japanese also are heavy purchasers of Australian tallow. Beginning about two years ago, they doubled their former acquisitions and now there is no sign of any diminution. Tallow is an essential ingredient in the manufacture of modern high grade explosives. Both the wheat and tallow purchases are a matter of common knowledge in the London markets, through which these products normally pass.

From another source I learn that the Japanese are still buying aeroplanes and parts and submarine engines in both England and Switzerland in such quantities which no peacefully disposed nation is likely to require. The Japanese explanation is that Japanese learned to eat wheat during the war and they now are permanent buyers in the market for this commodity.

Increased Demand for Soap

Regarding tallow they say the demand for soap has increased recently in Japan and it is a fact that Lever Bros., the great English soap makers, have recently opened a Japanese branch. It should be remembered however, that the European soap factories were most useful as munition plants during the late war.

Another explanation in some diplomatic circles here is that the Japanese have eyed on the Russian aggression and supporting this view the obvious hostility of the Russians and Japanese at the Genoa Conference.
