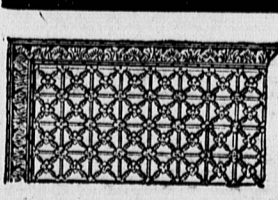
LACK OF POWER

If your car loses its power quite suddenly, although every cylinder appears to be firing it is usually due to valves. That is of course if it is engine trouble. The first thing to look for, though, is dragging brakes. It is possible, especially after a wet spell (weather) for mud to have gotten into the emergency brake shoe assembly and seized it. This could easily happen and not be known by the operator, as in all probability the emergency brake lever would work about the same as usual but it would be working only on the brake that is free and the other rod would be bending.

To test for brake dragging, take the car to the top of a slight incline—let it be very slight when the car should roll along quite freely. If it does not, you must inspect the brakes at once. If the brakes are in proper order, consider oil dilution in the motor. Has the oil been changed? The test for valves in poor condition is to drive the car very slowly in high gear. If the car lurches it is a positive indication of valve trouble, assuming the carburetor to be adjusted properly and all plugs working properly. Depleted tires will also cause power loss, as will lubrication along the propeller assembly, transmission and differential.

QUESTIONS—Can old oil be used again after it has settled?
ANS.—No, without it has been properly "reclaimed."

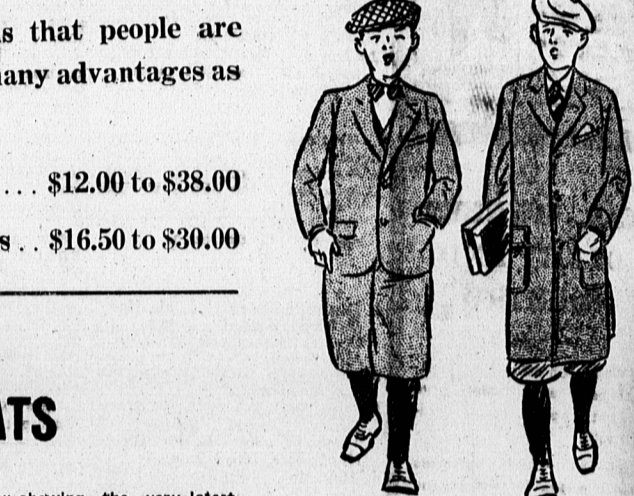
