PREMIER'S PLEASANT TRIP TO CONSERVATIVE CONFERENCE

Enthusiastic and Optimistic Liberal-Conservatives From All the Provinces Exchange Views On Matters Of Importance To The Party And To Canada.

Premier Stewart, interviewed by a representative of The Guardian, expressed himself as delighted with his visit to Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto. In Montreal he completed the delivery of the recent bond issue to the Brokers, the Royal Securities Corporation. By this personal delivery he saved the interest, insurance and other charges on the amount which would have been incurred by the transmission of the cash to Charlottetown which would have amounted to several hundred dollars.

At Ottawa he attended the Taxation Conference which had been called by the Acting Minister of Finance. The conference lasted two days and many matters were discussed by the members, the Provincial Treasurers of the various provinces represented. The members feeling they had no power to bind their respective governments to any particular line of action with respect to the various subjects discussed recommended that a larger and more representative conference be held at a date to be fixed by the Premiers of Ontario and Quebec, if possible, before the next session of the federal parliament. It was recommended that the Premiers and any of their ministers who could do so should attend the proposed conference. The following subjects were suggested as desirable for discussion.

McLACHLAN'S POLICY AS LABOR EDITOR

Protest by Local No. 11 is Disregarded by Convention.

SYDNEY, Nov. 21.—A demand for a direct election representative of labor on the Nova Scotia Workmen's Compensation Board was expressed in a resolution endorsed by the U. M. W. District Convention in session here this morning. Another resolution from No. 11 Local, explaining its refusal to support the Maritime Labor Herald, calls for censure of that paper on the grounds that it expresses the views of the editor and a small group, rather than of the district as a whole.

CAIRO MOURNS DEATH OF BRITISH GENERAL

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—Canada's trade with France is increasing rapidly according to figures issued here by the French consulate. During the first eight months of 1924, it was \$106,863,000, an increase of 112,284 francs in value.

- DUBLIN, Nov. 21.—Peter Hughes, member of the Dail Eireann from County Louth, was today appointed Minister of Defense of the Irish Free State and his appointment was announced by the Dail. President Cosgrave has been filling the position since the resignation of Richard Mulcahy.

- PARIS, Nov. 21.—Following a conference at the Foreign Office last night it was intimated that France had no intention of scrapping the Geneva protocol and still hoped for its adoption in one form or another.
- LONDON, Nov. 21.—Foreign Minister Chamberlain today sent a note to the Russian Ambassador Rakovsky declaring that the new British government is not able to recommend approval of treaties between Britain and Russia signed by the Labor government of former Premier Ramsay MacDonald.
- PARIS, Nov. 21.—Florence Kling Harding, widow of Warren G. Harding, twenty-ninth chief executive of United States, died here today.
- PARIS, Nov. 21.—Finance Minister Clementel has arranged with Morgan interests for a loan to France of \$100,000,000 at seven percent.
- TOKIO, Nov. 21.—Major Pedro Zanni, Argentine world flier, has been instructed by his home government to remain in Japan until spring when he will continue his journey.
- DUBLIN, Nov. 21.—The Free State government's reverse at the polls in two by-elections reported yesterday is balanced by two victories in the southwest. Cork has returned two governmental candidates by a big majority, one in Cork City where the Republican Lord May or French was defeated, and the other in East Cork where Michael Walsh the Republican aspirant lost.

FIVE PERISH IN PLYMOUTH P.A. FIRE

Loss of \$75,000 Incurred in Early Morning Blaze.
5 DEAD; ONE HURT

PLYMOUTH, Pa., Nov. 21.—Five lives comprised the total of a fire which destroyed seven frame buildings in the business section here today. The dead are Mrs. Martin Sherako, her niece, Emily Petroski, 11 years old, and three unidentified boarders in the Sherako home. Another boarder, Edward Alexton, was taken to a hospital at Wilkesbarre in a serious condition.

REID IS FOUND GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Bank of England Credits Soviet Gov't. With \$88,000,000

MOSCOW, Nov. 21.—Leonid Krassin, who will leave next week for his new post as Soviet ambassador to France, today told employees of the commissariat of foreign trade that despite the refusal of Russia a loan the Bank of England has allowed the Soviet government credits amounting to \$88,000,000.

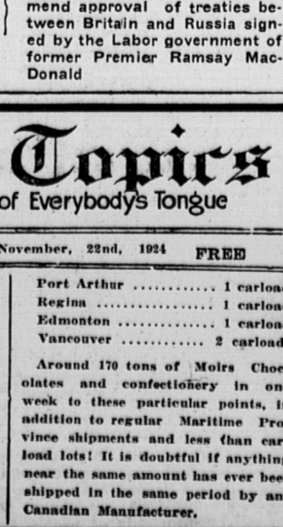
King's Got \$600,000 From Carnegie Fund Last Year

The report shows that the corporation paid \$600,000 to the University of King's College, Halifax, N. S. This amount was voted King's College in 1922-23 but was not authorized until last year.

SMYTHE STARTS ON JOURNEY TO ROME

CALAIS, France, Nov. 21.—G. H. G. Smythe, of Toronto, who mastered the stormy waters of the English Channel in his frail canoe a few days ago after almost losing his life a short while previous in attempting the crossing, left here today for Rome on the second stage of his paddling trip from London to the Italian capital for a bet of \$100,000. He resumed his journey on the St. Omer Canal going down through the department of Pas de Calais to Paris, then via Dijon, Lyons and Marseilles to Montreuil. After a short stay at the famous gambling resort he will paddle down the Tiber on the last stage of his trip which took him from Sydney, Nova Scotia, Canada.
