The city schools closed yesterday for the midsummer vacation. The excellent programs which were carried out were heartily enjoyed by a large number of visitors at each school. Lists of the winners of special prizes, certificates, and so forth are published herewith.

WEST KENT SCHOOL
 The closing exercises of West Kent School were held at ten o'clock yesterday morning with Councillor E. A. Foster and Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, members of the City School Board, presiding. Principal Johnston by his report of the year's work stated that the enrollment this year was the largest in the history of the school the total being 531, of whom 138 were girls. 48 Public School Certificates from the Department of Education were awarded to Grade VIII pupils, 20 final certificates were awarded by the Board of School Trustees to successful pupils in Grade X. The Governor General's Medal was won by Miss Mary Stewart. Presentation of certificates and prizes was made by Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, in his address, Rev. Dr. Vincent commended the pupils, parents, teachers and principal for the excellent work done during the year. Dr. MacMillan in eulogizing the splendid work of pupils and teachers paid a special tribute to the principal H. Johnston for his devotion to his life work, and his untiring efforts on behalf of the boys and girls under his supervision. The success of the school is largely due to his guiding hand. The chairman, Mr. E. A. Foster, complimented the school on their marvellous showing in athletics, and stated that great praise and credit was due to Mr. Louis Campbell for the high standing of the school in this phase of its work. The very creditable showing made by West Kent Cadet Corps was specially mentioned by the chairman, who praised the efficient leadership of their instructors, Captain D. N. Bell, and Vice-principal, H.W. Yeo. The Major McNutt Trophy for the best platoon in the West Kent School Cadet Corps, was awarded to No. 4 platoon under the leadership of Lt. Charles Hyndman. The presentation was made by the chairman Mr. Foster. Both Dr. McMillan and Mr. Foster highly complimented Prof. Thompson on the excellent training he had given the pupils and remarked that the singing on the present occasion was the best they had ever heard at the school. Both chairmen wished the pupils and teachers a very enjoyable holiday. Mrs. Wilkins on behalf of the Daughters of the Empire presented special prizes to Harold Black of Grade IX, and Miss Mary Stewart of Grade X for highest standing in History. She announced that another competition in essay writing would be sponsored by the I. O. D. E. next fall, and prizes would be awarded in December. There was a very large attendance of parents and friends.
