MR. KING AND THE FARMERS

The Patriot this evening, both on its editorial and front page, makes a great spurge of a four hour speech by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, in which it states he "repealed" the Bennett Government for removing taxation from the rich and adding it to the burdens of the poor.

Why does the Patriot not inform its readers that when the United States put an embargo on cream from Quebec and Ontario going into the U. S., that those farmers, who had their herds all ready producing, had to immediately turn to making butter which was to be sold in Montreal and Toronto in competition with New Zealand butter coming in to Canada under a one cent tariff but when Mackenzie King saw the condition arising out of his previous low rate, he raised the duty to 4 cents, effective Oct. 20, 1930.

Did you notice that Mrs. Higgins has got a black eye. Yes, an' I say it ain't respectable with'er husband not out of jail for another week yet."

We are now experiencing, would have come six months earlier, as Mr. Bennett's 8 cent duty came into effect before the 4 cents placed by Mr. King, and New Zealand could have shipped profitably against a 4 cent tariff. Therefore the farmers are glad that Mr. Bennett came into power to stop this importation and make possible a present and future market for their own production.

DR. WICKWARE REPORTS

ON CONFERENCE—Dr. Wickware, who returned to Summerside on Tuesday evening gave a report of the conference he had attended at Ottawa in connection with fox diseases, to directors attending an executive meeting of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association held at their head office on Tuesday night. Mr. S. Shelton Sharp, president, presided. Dr. Wickware in company with others walked on Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, Dr. J. H. Grisdale, Deputy Director of Experimental Farms, Dr. Hilton Veterinary Director General of Canada and conferred with Major Dunkin of England on fox diseases and as a result arrangements are being made to carry out at the research laboratories at Hull, Quebec, the recommendations of Major Dunkin on fox diseases. The question of quarantining of foxes is being carefully considered by the Department of Agriculture with a view to adopting a policy best suited to the industry. —S

The meeting was then opened for general discussion and some interesting points were brought out in regard to the ranching of mink and the present and future price of mink. It is considered by many prominent men in the fur trade to be one of the best paying businesses today. Mink can be raised at a small cost and the price of mink is advancing at the present time and will no doubt continue to do so.

It was disclosed at the meeting that a representative of Lamson's, of New York, visited an Island ranch and was delighted with the appearance of the mink raised. It was suggested that the business should be written up and advertised in the press and fur trade journals. It was moved by Mr. L. B. Crue and seconded by Mr. Roy Duggan that the Association purchase ten picked skins to be placed on the Montreal market, as specimens of Island ranch mink. A motion was passed that the levy on kittens be placed in the hands of the directors.

Mr. J. L. Saunders paid a high tribute to the President, Mr. Forbes in the manner in which he approached the Government at the time the Association was being incorporated and also to Dr. Callbeck for his interest in the Association. Co-operative marketing was discussed and some valuable suggestions made.

Mr. L. M. McNeill addressed the meeting and expressed the opinion that there were great possibilities in the collective marketing of pelts, as has been demonstrated by the fox industry. Buyers are not interested unless there is a sufficient quantity to be marketed. Careful organization and the manner in which they are marketed is the chief factor in getting the best results. A motion was passed for the directors to make arrangements to deal with this matter if necessary. Mr. Saunders suggested that the Association should give members an opportunity to see mink from good ranches so that they can have an idea of what constitutes a first class mink. ing the tariff and trade policies of the present administration. Liberals believed that only under a policy which would expand trade, rather than restrict it, would improvement come in conditions in this country. In some cases, he claimed, the government had not raised the tariff ten or fifteen percent but two hundred and three hundred percent. He failed to see how members representing rural constituencies could fail to pass up criticism of that sort and which the Liberal amendment aimed at.

Opposed to Change  
In Gold Standard  
Suspension of redemption of Dominion notes in gold, as advocated in the sub-amendment, did not meet with the approval of Mr. King. He did not think Parliament was qualified to express itself on this matter now. Why should such a step be taken during these times of world-wide depression? Furthermore, if such a step were contemplated it should have been taken before the flotation of the Canadian conversion loan and not ask people to invest their money under the impression they would be repaid in gold and now suggest they should be repaid by deflated currency.

"The Prime Minister," said Mr. King, "has adopted a very different attitude in accounting for conditions in this country in his budget speech than he did this time last year. He now speaks of a world depression."

When the election was being carried on last year, said Mr. King, the depression was beginning. The Liberal government saw this and brought down policies which it believed would help to meet the situation. Had those policies been followed, while the country could not have escaped the depression it would be in a much better position than it was now.

Premier Keeping His Promises  
The Prime Minister wanted to establish for himself the reputation as a man who kept his promises. If these involved any personal sacrifice on the part of Conservative members he (Mr. King) could see the reason for their applause; but when it meant that the money must come from taxation of the people he failed to see where any credit could be attributed to Mr. Bennett. The promises of yesterday were the taxation of today.

The Prime Minister had led the electors to believe that the money was coming from some invisible source. He should have told them that it would come from increased taxation. Mr. King believed the people of Canada would be much more ready and willing to forgive Mr. Bennett a little delay in fulfilling his promises rather than be weighed down with a burden of taxation for years to come.

Is Peeved At Laughter  
OTTAWA, June 17—In a whirlwind finish to a four hour speech on the budget today, Hon. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, called upon the government to establish a non-partisan unemployment relief board to deal with the grave conditions in Canada. He made the suggestion in good faith, declared Mr. King. He thought that unemployment relief should be organized. The situation was serious. Not only the unemployed who were walking the streets but those who stayed in their homes and concealed their worry and anxiety over growing debt and vanishing resources were concerned.

"And," asserted the opposition leader warmly, indicating the Prime Minister and members of the Conservative party seated opposite, "the government sits by and exempts millionaires from income tax."

His suggestion should be adopted, Mr. King declared. At this point the Prime Minister laughed. "And the Prime Minister laughs at it," concluded Mr. King. Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals, moved the adjournment of the debate.

would be no Canadian National Railways left to tell the tale," said Dr. Manion. No blame for these expenditures could attach to Sir Henry Thornton, he said. "The statement that we are enemies of the Canadian National is not true," said Dr. Manion. "Any man who is an enemy of the Canadian National is not a good Canadian."

Hon. Ian MacKenzie, Liberal member for Vancouver centre, following Dr. Manion and he lost no time carrying the fight to the Government benches. It ill became any member of the administration to "cast aspersions upon the Rockefeller Institute" when Premier Bennett himself was a former director of the Imperial Oil Company. Turning directly to Dr. Manion, the former Liberal Cabinet Minister advised him "to be quiet about association." What the Opposition demanded was a "frank and public statement on the Government's unemployment policy," proceeded Mr. MacKenzie. It did not want a "long distance statement from the absent Minister of Labor (Senator G. D. Robertson) who is now in British Columbia." Referring to the "vicious attack" upon the Canadian National Railways made by John Hackett, Conservative member for Standstead, Mr. MacKenzie said it was "the first political interference Sir Henry Thornton ever experienced since he assumed control."

Mr. MacKenzie contrasted the reception given to the Dunning budget by the British newspapers last year with that accorded the budget of Mr. Bennett. Mr. MacKenzie did not consider that his province was receiving adequate
