The Markets

MONTREAL, Aug. 13—There were 340 cattle, 170 calves, 708 hogs and 271 sheep and lambs for sale on the two markets including about 130 stags cattle held over from yesterday's market. The fresh arrivals of cattle were common cows and bulls, trade was dull. Bulls ranged from \$4.75 to \$5.50 and up to \$6 for good, stable bulls. There was not enough calves offered to make a market, although they were sold on a basis of \$7 to \$13. Lambs were unchanged at \$12.50 to \$13 for those of good quality and cows down to \$10. Sheep were steady. Hogs were steady to a shade easier. The bulk of the good quality hogs brought \$14.75 fed and watered flat, with a few sales at \$15. Light hogs made the bulk of the offering and were sold for \$14 to \$14.25. A few sales of mixed lots brought \$14.50. Sows were from \$10 to \$11.50.
