GERMAN LINER IS SOLD AT AUCTION.

LONDON, January 19.—The German liner Prinz Adalbert, which was captured at the beginning of the war, was sold at auction today on the order of the Prize Court for £152,000.

The Prinz Adalbert was on her way into a German port when the war began. Her captain testified to the hearing before the Prize Court in London which condemned the vessel as a prize that he put in at Falmouth at the request of American passengers. Great Britain not having entered the war at that time. She is 403 feet long, 6,043 tons gross, and was owned by the Hamburg-American Line.

WOMEN IN BRITISH LAW COURTS

LONDON, Jan. 29.—The statement made by Lord Buckmaster in the House of Lords in regard to the introduction of women into the law courts to release men has aroused considerable interest.

Inquiries made recently showed that about 60 women have been employed in the different divisions, and everywhere there was nothing but the highest praise for their work. In the central offices women are being trained to do the work of clerks who have joined the army; they are making entries of legal documents in case books and books open to the public search, and similar work of a technical nature. Six women typists have been engaged in the Sacri- zener's Office, but only for such ordinary work as shorthand and typewriting; engraving is still being done by all olderly men.

In the Admiralty division the marshal was very enthusiastic about the work of the ten women there. In the prize department their work is very varied; they keep the ledgers and look after the premiums of insurance payable on prizes. Others to ordinary typewriting and shorthand, but in most cases they receive the same salary as the men they replace. Their engagement is stated to be only temporary, but in at least one office it is hoped that the change may be a permanent one. Great care is taken in their selection which is partly the secret of the success.
