DREDGING.—Dredge No. 9 has completed operations at Montague, making a cut over three-quarters of a mile long this season. Last fall she was there for a month and a half. The dredging at Montague is the most satisfactory job that was ever done by any dredge in that harbor.

Thirteen feet of water at low spring tides is carried from the bridge outward for over a mile, leaving a comparatively straight channel upwards of 100 feet wide. The importance of the port of Montague as a shipping place certainly warrants such expenditure and it will be a great boon to the whole surrounding country when the farmers ship their surplus produce. The dredge also performed a few days' work for private parties for which \$115 per day was charged. Messrs. Poole & Thompson had their dock cleaned out. W. A. Poole & Co., Lower Montague, had their wharf dredged and also A. A. McDonald Bros., Georgetown. The dredge will now proceed to Pinette, where much-needed dredging will be taken up.

PREPARING AT THE "CAPE" FOR THE CAR FERRY

(St. John Standard.)

The prospects of a fast line connecting New Brunswick with Prince Edward Island are now growing brighter, and it is expected that next year will see the car-ferry connecting Cape Tormentine, New Brunswick, with Carleton Point, Prince Edward Island, in running order. This proposition entails the taking over by the federal government of the branch line running between Sackville and Cape Tormentine and a big expenditure of money on the necessary facilities for the ferry on both sides of Northumberland Strait.

The rumor to the effect that the federal government will, in the near future, absorb the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Railway is gaining considerable ground, owing to the fact that about two weeks ago a government inspecting engineer, with a party of engineers stationed at the Cape, went carefully over the road testing the bridges and grades with it, it is understood, a view to ascertaining the amount of repairs necessary before an I. C. R. flyer could be run over it in safety. The roadbed at present, although safe for the light trains handled by the company, will need repairs before being suitable for a heavy passenger train. Although it is believed that the taking over of the road by the government is but a matter of time, the travelling public, and especially those whose business takes them to Prince Edward Island, are eagerly looking forward to the day when the trip to the home of the black fox will be shortened by days.

Preparations for the commencing of hard work at Cape Tormentine in connection with the ferry terminal are now going forward, and during the summer engineers have been engaged locating the wharves, breakwater and other facilities. A long breakwater has already been built and another, it is understood, will soon be commenced. When finished these breakwaters will form a snug harbor for the ferry.

Until a few weeks ago dredging was being pushed in a channel leading to the proper entrance to the harbor and thousands of yards of mud and rocks were removed. About three weeks ago this dredge was sent away, it being found that larger and stronger vessels were necessary. The contractors are now awaiting the arrival of the big capacity dredges which are on their way there.
