**MR. EDWARD F. TIERNEY.**

 AMHERST, N. S., June 29.—A sad accident occurred tonight at Evans siding on Conductor Noonan's work extra which was unloading ballast at this siding when his brakeman, David Biggs, of Moncton slipped and had his foot caught between the rail and a wheel of a gravel car crushing the foot very badly. He was removed to Highland View Hospital at Amherst by the local express where he was taken in charge by Dr. C. W. Bliss, who says Biggs will lose part of his foot. Biggs had been on the job when he started to limp on one foot from the train to the ambulance. He is unmarried and resides at Moncton running on extras east and west.

## BULGARIA CLOSES ROUMANIA BORDER

Increasing Interest Centres in Balkan Situation.

(Canadian Press Despatch).  
 LONDON, June 29.—Interest in the expected grand offensive of the Allies shifted temporarily to-day to the situation in the Balkans with the revival of reports that Roumania is preparing to join the Allies. A heavily censored Bucharest despatch, telegraphed via Athens, reported that Bulgaria had closed her frontier against Roumania, and that Bulgarian troops were reported to be concentrating along the Roumanian frontier. The London Evening News received a Bucharest despatch reporting that the Roumanian cabinet at a special session took certain steps as a result of Bulgaria's movements. Roumanian military chiefs participated in the cabinet conference.

Vienna reports received at Amsterdam gave further explanation for Bulgaria's warlike moves against Roumania. The Bulgars, Vienna reported are uneasy because Greece yielded to the demands of the Allies. They fear not only that ex-Premier Venizelos will return to power and swing Greece to the side of the Allies, but that both the Roumanian and Greek armies may turn against Bulgaria, invading from opposite sides while the Austro-Germans are busy on other fronts. Berlin despatches to-day were silent on the latest Balkan developments, but laid heavy emphasis on the continued bombardment of German lines opposite the British front. The Canadian, Bucharest, is a systematic attempt to wreck German defensive works in preparation for a great infantry onslaught.

**Examine the Auto's Brakes**  
 Not only should the automobile driver give prompt attention to an indication that his brake is not acting with full efficiency and adjust it at once, but he should make it a point to examine all his brake connections periodically to see if they are working at or near the end of their possible movement. When the surface of the lining becomes worn, it may happen that when the brake lever is put backward to its fullest extent, with all the power available, it may hold the car nicely on a moderate grade or at a moderate speed, but will not permit further power being applied, for the reason that the levers and connections cannot be moved any farther in the direction required.

## MEXICAN TROUBLES

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Upon General Carranza's reception of a stern refusal to heed his demands for recall of American troops from Mexico hinges the question of a Mexican war, is the opinion of President Wilson's close advisers. They were prepared tonight for the possibility of open hostilities after the note, which will be sent forward tomorrow, has reached Carranza's hands.

While the diplomatic steps were in progress today the nation was stirring throughout its width and breadth with the movement of National guardsmen, mobilizing to guard the border. At least 100,000, and possibly a far larger number, were preparing for active service under President Wilson's call. For the present their mission will be purely one of defence, but should war come, they will be ready for that.

Official reports from many quarters show that a flame of popular feeling against the United States is being kindled throughout Mexico. Apparently it is being done with the sanction of General Carranza for the acts in many cases are those of his authorized military or civil agents.

From Jaurez to the west coast of Mexico posters have appeared calling the people to arms, and asserting that the United States is preparing to hurl its armies into Mexico. Chaotic conditions prevail everywhere, it is said, and relations are strained to the breaking point.
