GLACE BAY, N. S., Nov. 16.—Seventy minutes of gruelling play failed to determine the 1930 holders of the MacTier Challenge Cup as Caledonia, last year's winner of the trophy, emblematic of the eastern Canadian English football championships, battled to a 3-3 deadlock with Montreal English yesterday. The Caledonians are considering the advisability of making the trip to Montreal for a second game, but owing to the lateness of the season it was considered questionable whether another match would be arranged.

Yesterday's game was one of the most strenuous encounters ever played in Cape Breton. Neither team was able to register in the last thirty-five minutes of play after Caledonia had taken the lead early in the first half, only to see their advantage nullified as Montreal put over a scoring thrust later in the period. Darkness had settled over the field when the final whistle blew, and a decision to play two five minute overtime periods was altered, when referee Ray Smith of Mount Allison University ruled that owing to the deepening dusk he was unable to allow further play.
