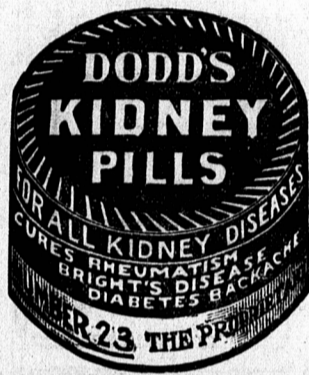

## IN MEMORIAM

By an old time friend  
In the death of John Bruce, of Red Point, which occurred a few weeks ago, the community has lost an old and highly respected member. He was seventy-one years of age. His wife and two daughters preceded him to the home above.

As I was intimately acquainted with him and the other members of his father's family, especially in our younger days, I would like to make a reference to him and his brothers predeceased him, David, who died last summer and James, a few years ago.

A sister also, Mrs. J. E. Robertson, passed away but extensive reference has already been made to her as a woman of excellent Christian character and devotion to every good work. I need not say more about her here than to heartily endorse all that has been said or written in her praise.

When I was a boy of about fourteen years of age, I was apprenticed to their brother Alexander, to learn the boot and shoe business. He was then unmarried so we made his father's house our home most of our spare time. I was treated as a son in the family. The father, George Bruce, who died a good many years ago, was a great Bible reader, and when I thought of studying for the gospel ministry, we had frequent and enjoyable discussions of Christian doctrines. I desire to pay tribute of respect and affection to the memory of these departed brothers, John, James and David. For physical strength they were

men of renown. It would be hard to find three such powerful men in one family! While this world naturally tend to prolong their life it was in part the reason of their death at a comparatively early age. There seemed to be no limit to their strength and endurance. They never spared themselves. They gloried in feats of hardship. David was the youngest and the rashest in his exploits of daring and effort. To do two days work of an ordinary man in one day was quite ordinary for him. If James had chosen the profession of pugilism he would have gained world wide fame in it. But he put his great strength into honest and hard work and made a comfortable home for his large family, and left a record of devotion they will cherish with pride and gratitude. He had a fine intellect and at one time thought seriously of studying for the gospel ministry. John was of a retiring disposition and unassuming manner but the three were each alike.

Like their father, for genuine Scotch hospitality in their homes it would be hard to surpass them. Like all true gianthood there was a gentleness in their nature that was admirable. This was especially observable in their homes. They were ever ready to help the poor and needy; the sick and suffering, and their sympathy with the sorrowing was genuine and deep. They were kind and tender-hearted; and while as a boy I admired their strength, I also appreciated their kindness. In a great religious revival conducted by Rev. D. G. McDonald in 1874, they were converted and joined the East Point Baptist Church. They were generous in their support of the church and the minister. Every Christian enterprise that appealed to them for help met sympathetic and generous response. Some of their children passed on before
