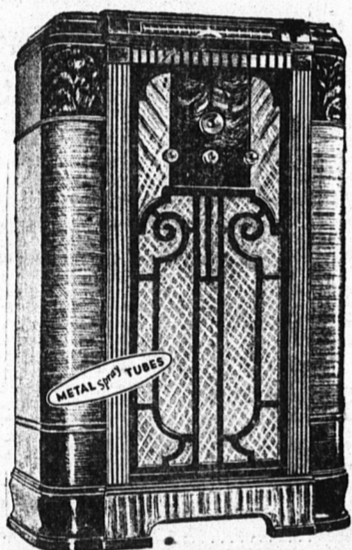

### Gas Tax In N. S. Reduced

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Dec. 16.—Reduction of one cent per gallon in the price of gasoline, effective in Nova Scotia today, was hailed by Premier Macdonald tonight as another benefit obtained through his Government's Gasoline Licensing Act. "Last year by the enactment of the gasoline Licensing Act, which put a stop to the extravagant and wasteful competition between the wholesalers of gasoline in this Province, the Government of Nova Scotia was enabled on May 22, 1934, to secure a reduction in the retail price of gasoline of one and one-half cent a gallon," he said tonight on his return from the Dominion-Provincial Conference in Ottawa. "Later the example set by Nova Scotia was followed by New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and they too secured a like reduction. "This year the Government of Nova Scotia joined in the application to the Tariff Board for a reduction in the duty on gasoline, and was represented by counsel before that body at its sittings at Halifax in June and again at Ottawa during the latter part of November. "At the concluding session of the Tariff Board, when all the evidence had been heard, the Imperial Oil Company agreed that the provisions of the Nova Scotia Gasoline Licensing Act had so enabled that company to reduce its distribution cost in this Province that a further reduction of one cent a gallon was justified. This reduction, I am advised, was put into effect this morning.

### OLDEST SERVANT OF ROYAL FAMILY DIES

WINDSOR, England, Dec. 18.—William Barker, 91, oldest servant of the Royal Family is dead. His first job was at the age of 15, when he used to wheel the Duchess of Kent, Queen Victoria's mother around the ground in a wheel chair. Afterwards for 20 years he was keeper of the historical royal grapevine at Cumberland Lodge, which yields thousands of bunches annually. He served at Windsor Castle throughout the reign of Edward VII and retired at 75.
