### CRONJE RETURNS TO TRANSVAAL

LONDON, Nov. 20.—General Cronje who surrendered to Lord Roberts at Paardeberg, and was afterwards confined at St. Helena has just sailed from Southampton for South Africa, accompanied by his wife and two sons.

The general has been in America where he conducted a military expedition. The expedition represented the scene at Paardeberg, and included the surrender of Cronje and his force to Lord Roberts. He intends to return to Potchefstroom and settle down on his farm to spend the remainder of his days quietly and peacefully.

He is quite reconciled to the new condition of affairs in South Africa, but thinks it will be some years before a complete reconciliation takes place between the British and the Boer.

One of Cronje's sons said that they had met many Boer irremediables in the United States who would prefer to return to South Africa under British rule rather than to remain in America.

Letters received from Boers in the Transvaal General Cronje says have informed him that affairs there are in a state of chaos, but eventually his correspondents thought, matters would be settled.

### TWO KILLED.

JAMESTOWN, N. Y., Nov. 21.—The east bound Atlantic express on the Erie railroad was wrecked at Falconer, three miles east of here, a few minutes before 6 o'clock last night. The passengers escaped with a severe shaking up. Two trainmen, Charles Kreiger, of Salamanca and William S. See, of Meadville (Pa.), were killed. The train was about two hours late when it left Jamestown and was being drawn by two engines in charge of Engineers Kreiger and See. At Falconer both engines and four coaches left the track. The engines tipped over burying the engines. The cause of the derailment is being investigated.

### NEWS FROM THE EAST.

The usual November weather is experienced at present, gales of wind and rain succeeded by squalls of snow and sleet. The farmers are getting on well with their fall ploughing and are preparing for winter.

The sports report will give scarce this fall. ### DOGGER BANK PREMEDITATED

At the recent dinner of the Navy League in London in honor of the anniversary of the battle of Trafalgar, Admiral Fremantle, in replying to the toast of the imperial forces, stated that he believed the navy had never been more up to date or ready for war than it was today.
