An exchange says: Despite the use of metal lath and patent finish, wooden lath production amounted to eight hundred and fifty-two million pieces worth one million, nine hundred and forty-three thousand dollars in Canada during 1910. This information has been obtained from statistics compiled by the Dominion Forestry Branch, which show that nearly thirty million more laths were produced in 1910 than in the year before, but that owing to a decrease in price per thousand, the total value of the industry was thirty-five thousand dollars less. Two-fifths of the total was cut in Ontario, which province has increased its 1909 production by 57 million or nearly 20 per cent, New Brunswick, the second province in importance, increased its proportion of the total from one-fifth to one-quarter, by cutting sixty-two million more than last year. The average price of laths in 1910 was \$2.28 per thousand, or 16 cents less than in 1909. The price varied considerably between the different provinces, British Columbia laths being \$1.66 per thousand, while in Prince Edward Island the price was \$2.67.

One of the remarkable happenings of the present season is the shipment of Prince Edward Island potatoes to the West. It is interesting to observe how the trend of trade changes, old markets disappearing and new ones developing from time to time. Twenty years ago or thereabouts anyone who would have told the Island farmer that his potatoes would be going west rather than south, would hardly have been taken seriously. In those days Boston was the great market, and all the Lunenburg vessels, once they were through with the fishery, were at this time of year engaged in carrying Prince Edward Island potatoes somewhere, mainly to Boston. The Mackinley Bill spoiled our chances in the American market and then for a while the potato business languished in the Island, as indeed, it did in all parts of the Maritime Provinces where it was carried on to any extent - our only export trade remaining is the West Indian and some quantities of our potatoes are still popular there. Gradually, however, improvement came about through the increase of local markets, at such places as Sydney and Glace Bay and other industrial communities. Besides, there were other things to be done with potatoes than sell them; the farmers could feed them to hogs, and when hogs were at a good price, the pigs got many potatoes. So potato culture gradually came into its own again. This year, in spite of a fairly good crop on the Island, prices are exceedingly high - higher than we have seen them at this season for a very long time, if ever. The reason of course is that the West needs the potatoes and is willing to pay the price. We have lost the Boston market, but we are still doing business at the old stand. The schooner carrying trade, too, on a large scale, is a thing of the past, as shipments from the Island are now made very largely in bags by rail and steamer. There is nothing of course very remarkable about this, but we cite it merely to show how unwise it is to feel discouraged when an avenue of trade we have been following successfully for a time is suddenly closed up; for, we may be sure that the man who works industriously and intelligently will find another along which his trade will develop as surely and successfully as the older one. Of course, every year may not be as good a year as the present one for potato prices, but there is this assurance for the Island producers that the number of potato consumers in Canada is increasing much faster than the quantity of potatoes produced, as compared with the old days - Maritime Merchant.
