

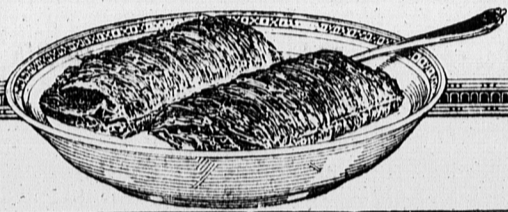
For That Acid Stomach

PERJURY IN THE ARBUCKLE CASE?

Important Witness is Missing—Movie Comedian Before Grand Jury Few Minutes—Formal Complaint Charging Murder

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—A statement expressing the conviction that perjury had been committed by one of the chief witnesses for the prosecution at the grand jury investigation of the death of Miss Rappe, was issued here early today by District Attorney Brady. He also charged that he believed "undue influence and pressure of a sinister character has been brought to bear" upon certain witnesses. Whether or not an arrest will be made in connection with his charge of perjury, he said, would depend on further developments. In his statement, District Attorney Brady charged that Miss Pyvron had changed her testimony before the grand jury from what she had given previously to the police and officials of the district attorney's office, that Miss Rappe had told her Arbutle had caused her injuries. Earlier last night it was reported Miss Pyvron refused to sign a statement that Miss Rappe had told her this and later it was said, she denied that she ever made the assertion concerning Miss Rappe. This Brady said. He also charged in his statement that Miss Alice Blake, another prosecution witness, was missing. District Attorney Brady's statement follows: "We have sent Miss Pyvron home under surveillance. The girl changed her story completely before the grand jury. Whether or not we shall arrest her and charge her with perjury will depend on further developments. I am convinced, however, that perjury has been committed by her. "I am convinced that undue influence and pressure of a sinister character has been brought to bear on her and other witnesses, one of whom, Alice Blake, has mysteriously disappeared from her home in Berkeley. We have been unable to find her. In spite of these efforts to thwart the ends of justice the investigation will proceed and no effort will be spared to bring the guilty ones to their deserts. "The Pyvron woman made a statement in the presence of Captain of Detective Matheson, Assistant District Attorney Uron and George Duffy. She repeated this statement time and again. Last night before the grand jury, she changed her testimony. "Arbutle, the last witness summoned by the grand jury during its five hour session, was aroused from a sound sleep about one o'clock this morning. He is reported to have declined to make any statement further than to explain that his lawyers had advised him to keep silent. "Not content with seeing the commandant, the fishermen enlisted the aid of James G. Hammond, secretary of the New London Chamber of Commerce, and Representative Richard G. Freeman. ST. JOHN, Sept. 14.—To create in Canada a Sea consciousness.

This object, which is only one of the four main principles of the Navy League, need not be dwelt upon here in St. John," said Lieut. Commander W. G. Lewin of Charlottetown, Maritime representative of the Navy League, in talking to a newspaper reporter last evening. "What St. John should have, however," Commander Lewin went on to say, "is a first class Boys' Naval Brigade. In Charlottetown there is a splendid brigade of sixty boys, fully equipped. They have their blue jacket uniforms, Winchester repeating rifles, two cutters and a comfortable headquarters. They man the boats, pull around the harbor and are very proud of their brigade." Commander Lewin explained that joining a Naval Brigade does not mean that the boy is in any way compelled to go to sea. It simply gives him a good nautical training, admitted by all to be useful in any career. The members learn sail-making, knotting, splicing, pulling and sailing. Physical drill is included in the course, and the results have been excellent. The ideals of the British Navy are inculcated, and boys of all classes have benefited by membership in Brigades.

The Navy League.

As Special Commissioner for the Navy League—an appointment recently made, Commander Lewin is in St. John to preach the gospel of the Navy League, and to explain its peace time policy which, he points out, is both practical and patriotic. Its four aims are, relief work among sailors and their dependents, Sailors' Institute work, Boys' naval brigade work, Education and propaganda work with the object of creating a sea consciousness.

In regard to relief work it should be remembered that the Government does not pay pensions for men who lose their lives in the merchant service, and the Navy League is the only institute which supplies this need, caring for widows and orphans of seamen. Referring to the educational work, Commander Lewin said that most of the funds provided for Sailors' Institutes come from the Prairie Provinces who have responded most generously to appeals. They realize the necessity of keeping up

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such institutions and homes and that the responsibility lies upon the inland provinces quite as much as upon the sea ports. As a broad principle the following definition of the Navy League may be quoted: "Membership in the Navy League should proclaim to the world that the member has taken his or her stand on the side of right, liberty and justice, which things have been made possible to the world by the British traditions of the sea."

Tours Nova Scotia. Commander Lewin arrived in St. John from Halifax yesterday and returned this morning. He intends to tour Nova Scotia in the interests of the League, after which he will come to New Brunswick, conferring with R. E. Armstrong, president, and C. B. Allan, secretary, a campaign for funds to be used in the enlargement of the St. John Seamen's Institute, will be arranged.

The Special Commissioner is a Devonshire man who speaks with the pleasant voice of men from that historic portion of Great Britain from which sprang Drake and so many famous sailors of the past and of today. During the war, Lt. Commander Lewin held the interesting and important post of King's Harbor-Master at Scapa Flow, where he was in charge of the salvage work consequent upon the sinking of the German ships. Demobilized only twelve months ago, he has taken up the work of the Navy League with enthusiasm. His headquarters are at Charlottetown, where already much has been accomplished to increase membership and teach people what the Navy League really means.

May Ask Britain To Replace ZR-2

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—The British Government will be asked to turn over one of its rigid airships to the United States to replace the dirigible ZR-2, which crashed recently in England with a loss of forty-four lives. In all probability one of the three German airships given to the British under the terms of the armistice will be requested. The proposal is to be made in connection with the financial settlement between the American and British Governments over the loss of the ZR-2. OCEAN HIKERS AT ROCKLAND

ROCKLAND, Me., Sept. 14.—The Halifax and St. John to Vancouver ocean hikers, the second party to arrive at this port, sailed the harbor at 9.30 o'clock this morning. They left Bar Harbor at 11 o'clock Saturday morning, and after a sail of twenty-two miles arrived at Bartlett Isle, where they stopped for the night.
