What An Informer Is.

The Rev. Father Scanlan The Noted Temperance Worker Defines The Term.

MONTREAL, June 19.—At grand mass in St. Ann's Church, in Sunday, the Rev. Father Scanlan explained to his parishioners what he understood by the word "informer." A young lady who gave evidence recently against a party who had applied for a renewal of his license, objected to the commissioners to being called an informer. As Father Scanlan had asked the young lady to give evidence in the case, he took occasion on Sunday to express his views on informers. "An informer," he said, is a man without a heart, a man who will betray his country or any sacred cause. In my work against the liquor traffic in this parish I could get very little assistance from the men, but some of the ladies of the parish were good enough to come to my assistance, and because they did some low, mean, despicable brutes called them informers. Father Scanlan asked his hearers if they thought that an informer was a person who did anything that would help to save their fathers, brothers' sons, and husbands from a drunkard's grave. "No he said, but an informer is one who will assist the liquor dealers in their evil traffic and help send souls to hell. Those were informers who informed the liquor dealers what the priests and others were doing against them to try and stamp out the evil of Sunday liquor selling and sooner or later they would suffer for it. He said that God's blessing would fall upon those who gave him any assistance in the work he had taken up, and what they would do in the cause they would never regret.

Miss Booth at Grimsby Park.

Grimsby Park, July 19.—After a week's quiet everybody was prepared for the coming of Miss Eva Booth, Commissioner of the Salvation Army for Canada. Miss Booth was accompanied by her secretary, Brigadier Gaskin, and Mrs. Gaskin, Staff-Captain Stanyon, Adjutant Welch and the full headquarters band under the leadership of Staff-Captain Morris. The Salvationists arrived on the boat yesterday in time for the grand instrumental and vocal concert in the evening, which attracted an audience of nearly two thousand. The storm of the afternoon had passed away, and hundreds of the surrounding country came in until the temple held an immense congregation. If possible Miss Booth was more impressive and terribly in earnest than in the afternoon, as she depicted the subtlety and destructiveness of sin. Taken as a whole the visit of Miss Booth must be accounted as one most pregnant for good.—Toronto Globe.
