The eight steamers of the eastern fleet, after working their way through the ice for some 250 miles up the eastern coast of Newfoundland, are now jammed in the heavy ice floes off Cape St John, at the northern point of Notre Dame Bay, and about 125 miles south of the easterly entrance to the Strait
