Reserves Show Good Increase

BOSTON, April 28 - (A.P.) - An increase of 3.9 percent in the balance available for reserves and common dividends was reported today by the New England Power Association for the first quarter of 1932 as compared with the corresponding months of 1931.

Although gross earnings decreased from \$14,503,973 to \$14,063,564 this year, the net income for reserves and dividends increased from \$3,000,999 to \$3,086,911. Preferred dividends this year were \$1,000,801 as against \$994,209 the Association reported.

Agreement Saves Millions

PARIS, April 28 - (A. P.) - An agreement by which United States Corporations doing business in France will save millions of dollars in taxation was signed today by Ambassador Walter E. Edge and Premier Andre Tardieu.

Similar accords are pending between France and Great Britain, Italy, Germany and Belgium. The agreement eradicates the double taxation which has been carried by United States houses with branches in France since 1926. Under this tax regulation, all foreign corporations doing business in this country have been assessed from 18 to 18 percent on that part of their dividends ascribed to French operations.

Numerous United States organizations will be affected, among the outstanding being the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, General Motors, Ford Motors, The Guaranty Trust, The National City Bank, The Chase National Bank and the Boston Blacking Company.

Strong Opponent To M. Tardieu

PARIS, April 28 - (A. P.) - The newspaper Le Journal today quoted Eduard Herriot, principal opponent of Premier Tardieu in the campaign for the election of deputies to the French Parliament next Sunday, as saying that if he were asked to form as Premier a radical government with Socialist support as he did in 1924, he could not accept.

Former Premier Herriot, Mayor of Lyons, is leader of the powerful opposition Radical Socialist group in the Chamber of Deputies. His party is more nearly Liberal than Radical or Socialist, in the Canadian sense. The Socialist party in France, a strong faction in Parliament, is led by Leon Blum. Both Premier Tardieu and M. Blum have made overtures to the Radical Socialists in an effort to gain their support.

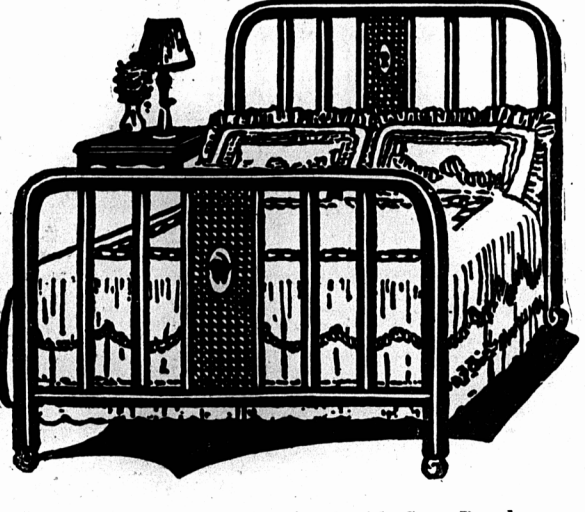

Big-Five Parley Is Cancelled (By P. I. Lapsey, Jr., Associated Press Staff Correspondent) GENEVA, April 28 - (A.P.) - Another hope for early conciliation of the differences between France and Germany, which would pave the way for the success of the world disarmament conference, collapsed today with the cancellation of the "Big Five" parley scheduled for Friday.

STAYS RURAL DOCTOR PASSING HALIFAX, N. S., April 28 - A forecast that in 10 years very few doctors would be practising in rural sections was given in the legislature tonight by Dr. M. E. McGarry, opposition, (Inverness). All serious medical and surgical cases were now sent to the hospitals, he pointed out, and rural practitioners were only making initial visits in these cases, whereas hitherto they had attended them throughout the course of the afflictions. The income of the rural doctor was gradually dwindling to the point where he could no longer afford to render the services which an up to date practitioner should afford his clientele. Unless facilities in the way of community nurses were afforded rural doctors so that they could practise their profession in an intelligent way their patients would all go to the hospitals, the Inverness member predicted, as the doctors would only become consigners of the sick to the hospitals of their choice. "That umbrella of yours looks as though it had seen better days" "Well it certainly has had its ups and downs."
