In Memoriam Catholic Youth Club Organized

Mrs. Christina Martin, widow of the late Wm. A. Martin, passed away at her home in Valleyfield West on the evening of Tuesday, November 18th, 1941.

Before her marriage Mrs. Martin was Christina Nicholson, daughter of the late Archie Nicholson and Margaret Nicholson, and was born in Glen William, where her parents settled on coming from the Isle of Skye.

In the later years of her life Mrs. Martin endured considerable sickness, but she was active and about her daily work when she suffered a stroke on Sunday morning, October 12th. She was so affected that she lost the power of speech. Her mind, however, remained quite clear and keen, and she bore her affliction with great patience and cheerfulness.

But she gradually weakened until the end came. She is survived by four daughters and two sons, Mrs. Herb Gillis of Flat River; Margaret and Flora of Haverhill, Mass.; Christina at home; Alex at home and Archibald, stationed now at Camp Borden, Ont. She leaves, also two sisters, Mrs. Jno. D. Collins, Mrs. Leverett Acorn and Mrs. Raymond Mansfield.

The funeral was held from her home on Thursday, November 20th and was conducted by Rev. J. Milton Fraser, minister of the Valleyfield church, who was assisted by Rev. W. C. Picketts of Murray Harbour. The music was in charge of the choir under the direction of Mrs. W. A. Bruce. Pallbearers were: Jno. D. Collins, Malcolm D. Martin, Munroe Bruce, W. A. Bruce, Herb MacKenzie and Jno MacLennan. Interment took place at the Valleyfield cemetery.

Mrs. Martin will be greatly missed, not only in the home, but in the whole community and the church of which she was a faithful member and to which she gave herself in devoted service with diligent use of the talents and gifts The Master had entrusted to her care.
