To meet its financial needs the treasury still depends on borrowing for approximately half the

government expenditure. The cheap money screw is being turned tighter. The rates for bank and treasury bills have been cut by one-half of one per cent and medium and long-term rates are likely to follow.

In the field of foreign currency, the end of lend-lease necessitated immediate sharp retrenchment since the new Anglo-American financial agreement took months to complete in the sterling bloc. A similar abrupt termination of wartime arrangements was avoided, and the European countries linked to sterling before the war have shown their willingness to resume the former close co-operation with the United Kingdom.

The big gap in Britain's balance of trade and payments revealed by post-war trade returns and accumulation of large sterling accounts in London by the Dominions and Empire countries will call for speedier settlement even if the 50-per-cent increase in exports volume sought by the government is achieved.

During 1945, however, these problems of domestic and foreign finance did not attain their full extent and for the future it is anticipated that the government's powers will prove extensive enough to keep the supply of finance in line with any big changes which may occur in the direction and volume of production.

End Of War Fails To Ease British Financial Problems

 LONDON, Dec. 28 — (C P) — Britain's financial problems have been accentuated, rather than eased, by the end of the war and the switchover to peace conditions. To reconcile the rival claims of housing, export trade and industrial reconversion against the background of limited supplies of goods calls for the utmost care in the allocation of long-term funds.

With the Bank of England nationalized and thus in form as well as fact under treasury control and a national investment board to decide priorities for competing claimants for capital, the chancellor of the exchequer will be well-equipped to cope with technical problems.

But there is widespread belief that the nationalization of basic industries and the conversion of higher-interest loans by the new Labor government under Prime Minister Attlee will complicate the technical difficulties.

Financial interests took the change of government in stride. The upward swing in stock which began with the end of the European war has continued and in early December the industrial shares index was at all-time record levels.

Expenditure on war services passed its peak two years ago and has been declining since then, but hostilities brought no immediate sharp drop. Late in November the supply branches still needed \$15,000,000 (\$87,500,000) daily. Tax relief must therefore wait until the next fiscal year and the treasury's floating debt keeps increasing.

To meet its financial needs the treasury still depends on borrowing for approximately half the

During 1945, however, these problems of domestic and foreign finance did not attain their full extent and for the future it is anticipated that the government's powers will prove extensive enough to keep the supply of finance in line with any big changes which may occur in the direction and volume of production.
