Tragic Accident At Summerside

A tragic sequel to the visit of the circus to Summerside occurred on Saturday when Elzior Blacquiere, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alban Blacquiere was found dead in the basement of his home with a rope around his neck and the end tied to a pipe running along the ceiling. The boy had been playing by himself. His mother, in the course of preparing the dinner for the family, went to the cellar for potatoes and her eyes met the horrifying sight of her son in an upright position hanging from a rope. His toes just touched the floor so it is assumed that the rope tightened on his neck and choked him. Mrs. Blacquiere immediately cut the rope, but it was too late, her son was dead. The coroner was called and decided that no inquest would be necessary. It is believed by the parents and friends of the family that the young lad was trying to imitate some of the acrobatic stunts he had seen at the circus the day before. He was the eldest of a family of eight children and the home is at the corner of Park and North Market Streets. Mr. Blacquiere is employed at the Summerside Airport. The funeral will be held this morning to St. Paul's Church.—S.

130 Air Cadets Go Into Camp At Summerside

130 Air Cadets from six Maritime squadrons arrived at the Summerside R. C. A. F. Station on Saturday to begin a two-week summer camp. The squadrons represented are: Summerside, Queen Elizabeth High School, Halifax; Kiwanis, Halifax; Bedford, Dartmouth, and Stellarton.

CALGARY, July 6.—(CP)—All the old-time color of the Calgary Stampede, one of Canada's most widely-known annual events, will return when the show opens its 35th renewal tomorrow, and the directors have added a new wrinkle.

The pre-war features of blue-jeaned cowboys and fiddling and dancing quadrilles will be resumed and in addition war-painted Indians will greet visitors at railway stations throughout the six-day jamboree.

The new twist is the election of a stampedee queen. She is Doreen Richardson of Calgary, the nominee of a drama organization in a contest sponsored by the Associated Canadian Travellers.

The long-legged, 19-year-old Miss Richardson will ride on a float tomorrow in the parade of the stampedee opening ceremony of the fair.

At the first stampedee in 1912, the cowboys and gals rode for "world championships" but in recent years the show officials have moderated the crowns and when some 400 cowboys begin bucking tomorrow, they will be after "North American" titles in such things as bucking horse riders and calf ropers.
