Lach Reneges, Decides To Remain In Hockey

MONTREAL, Aug. 23 (CP)—Elmer Lach, who announced an unenviable assortment of plaw and fancy fractures during a nine-year National Hockey League career, has recalled his retirement declaration and will return to the ice.

General manager Frank Selke of Montreal Canadiens said today Lach will report to Canadian training camp at St. Hyacinthe, Que., Sept. 15.

The decision was left entirely to Lach, who twice suffered fractured jaws last season. Dependent upon his series of misfortunes and missing the Stanley Cup playoffs, Lach announced his retirement after the close of the season.

Complete recovery and a flaming competitive spirit have caused Lach to change his mind. Along with other members of the squad he will undergo a thorough medical examination before the training season starts, but it is known he already has the approval of his personal physician.

The return of the starry, 31-year-old centre player will bolster the chances of the team that at the moment is pretty much intact from last season.

Mize Sale Was Perfectly Legal

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (AP)—The sale of John Mize by New York Giants of the National League to New York Yankees of the American League was perfectly legal, although there is a baseball rule of no major-league trades or deals after June 15.

Before June 15 player contracts may be swapped or sold within a league without the club's notifying anyone. To transfer a player from a club in one league to a club in the other, however, waivers must be obtained.

After June 15 all trades or sales are made under the waiver rules. The waiver rule really is divided into two divisions, one involving the other involving both leagues.

The Mize deal was made through intra-league waivers. Only the National League club had a chance to claim him. If none did, the Giants had the right to peddle him to any American League club with which they could make a deal.
