JUDGE KILLAM DEAD AT OTTAWA

RUSSIANS AND THE TERRORISTS

Sentence Of Death Passed On Them Will Be Carried Out

St. PETERSBURG, March 1.—(Special)—General Hazenkamp, chief of the general staff, over-ruling the plea of the counsel of the defence, has confirmed the death sentence passed by a court martial on seven terrorists, including the mysterious Italian Calvino who was convicted of complicity in the plot against lives of Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasievitch and M. Chicheglovitch.

TEN YEAR REST FOR SEAL HERDS

British Columbia Sealers Urge a Close Season Appeal To Government

OTTAWA, Feb. 29.—The representatives of the Canadian sealing industry, which has been brought to the point of effacement by reason of the Paris Award of 1893, to which the Japanese were not a party, are making a last appeal to the Imperial Government and through the British ambassador at Washington, to take some action which shall prevent complete destruction of the seals in Behring Sea.
