Medicalmen Discuss Dementia Praecox

HALIFAX, June 22 (CP) — Onset of early diagnosis in case of dementia praecox, a form of insanity commonly known as dementia praecox, was stressed before the Canadian Public Health Association today by Dr. Murray MacKay, medical superintendent at the Nova Scotia Hospital, a mental institution.

About 50 per cent of these patients admitted to mental hospitals have been ill over 18 months before the onset of the disease, he said.

Dr. MacKay estimated schizophrenia cost the province of Nova Scotia at least \$250,000 yearly, leaving out of consideration the loss in earning power of the sufferers. More hospital beds were occupied by schizophrenics than by all other mental patients combined.

Infantile paralysis occupied attention of the public health delegates during part of the session. A joint report prepared by officers of New Brunswick's Health Department referred to the outbreak in that province last year.

Dr. William Warwick, chief health officer of New Brunswick, said in the report, "the most recent epidemics have been definitely milder, due in part no doubt, to the change in definition of what constitutes a reportable case." Incidence of the disease was greatest in congested areas, "where it is too much to expect that any preventive

measures could be carried out by parents themselves, adding that in better residential districts, "children did actually stay in their own backyards."

"There are sharp differences of opinions in regard to the value of immune serum in the early treatment of poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis)." For our part we know of no indications against its use, and know of no alternative treatment, so the department of health recommended its use.

The first joint meeting of the two societies was today when they met at a banquet to hear an address by Sir Humphry Rolleston, physician to the late King George V. RICE DINNERS AND CHINESE REFUGEES

NEW YORK, June 19—Relief for Chinese refugees to the extent of about \$1,000,000 is expected from subscriptions to "bowl of rice" dinners to be held June 17 in about 1,600 cities throughout the United States.

The dinners will be held under the auspices of the United Council for Civilian Relief in China of which Colonel Theodore Roosevelt Jr. is national president.

Announcing the dinners, Col. Roosevelt said the number of war refugees in China at present "in all probably reached 60,000,000. The victims are being ravaged by six epidemics, cholera, typhus, amoebic and bacillary dysentery, malaria and meningitis.

"And I know what that means," said Col. Roosevelt. "I came out of China once weighing 98 pounds after an attack of one disease."

New York participants in the "bowl of rice" dinners will dine in eight Chinese restaurants in Chinatown, contributing \$5 a plate. Part of the district will be roped off later in the evening for the performance of a typical Cantonese fair, with juggling, Oriental dancing and fortune telling.
