

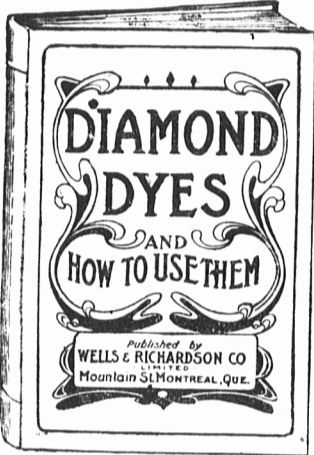

IN THE FAR EAST.

Just now things are looking more like peace between Russia and Japan but there is reason to fear that the break in the warcloud may be but temporary.

contingency that should war break out while they are on the way the Russian squadron on the way being superior to Japan's two newly purchased ships might capture the latter.

Upon the whole, the Times critic finds his original view confirmed, that "the Japanese fleet is superior to the Russian squadron in the East in most of the technical attributes that the efficiency in maritime war—namely, speed, armament, protection, and displacement".

Then there is the climate, both as affecting the land and sea operations. Most of the Russian fleet is at Port Arthur, but three of the best Russian ships are at Vladivostok.

The Times brings up the total Russian land force in the east now numbers 240,000 men, but deducting the great number of troops necessary to guard her long and vulnerable line of railway, and those necessary to suppress possible Chinese risings and garrison her fortresses, the fighting strength available against Japan would not exceed 140,000 men.

The Times critic concludes that the Japanese plan of campaign will be to attack the Russian fleet at the earliest opportunity, and, counting upon victory, and then to invest Port Arthur or Vladivostok or both, with a sufficient force to defeat any army that might be sent to their relief.
