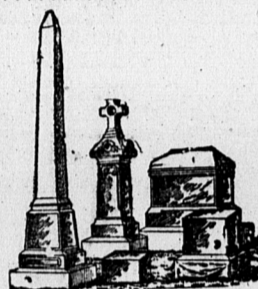

Rev. Dr. Campbell's 25th Anniversary

The Reverend T. Campbell, P. P., D. D., celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on the 5th instant. The celebration took place at the Sacred Heart Church, Alberton. Practically every priest in Prince County was in attendance.

The Rev. Doctor celebrated solemn high Mass, assisted by Rev. J. A. Gaudet as deacon, and Rev. Fr. Mullally as sub-deacon, with the Rev. M. Monaghan, D. D., as master of ceremonies. The local choir assisted by Rev. F. X. Gallant and other clergy, sang the Mass with unusual fervor and devotion under the direction of the organist, Miss Eileen Conroy.

Rev. P. C. Gauthier, D. D., for the assembled clergy, delivered the address to the jubilarian. Graceful eloquence flowed from his lips, as the Reverend speaker painted the wonderful power and influence of the priesthood. Passing from the general to the particular, he complimented the jubilarian on his many years of faithful service in the vineyard of his Master, where in he had discharged the onerous duties of his sacred calling with courtesy and grace that had endeared him to his parishioners and which had commanded and received the esteem and appreciation of those who were not of his fold. The Reverend speaker, swayed by the warmth of his sentiments for his brother priest, paid eloquent and elegant tribute to the many sterling qualities of the jubilarian, holding the congregation captivated by his fluency and ardour.

After the conclusion of the Mass an address on behalf of the parishioners was read by Mr. S. J. Burke and an accompanying purse presented by Mr. Martin M. Foley. The Reverend Doctor feelingly and brilliantly expressed his gratefulness to the assembled clergy, and the parishioners who had so thoughtfully and so generously remembered him upon the occasion of this jubilee. He had wished to a quieter and more retired celebration, but they had wished otherwise and their wishes had carried the day. In simple, touching language he recounted his advent to the parish, told of the great kindness of all towards him and since the time of coming amongst them generous kindness which he feared he would be unable to suitably repay. He had ever and always found his parishioners willing and eager to assist him in all his undertakings, nor was this willingness confined to the members of his own congregation, for from those beyond his fold he had always been accorded most generous assistance. He expressed a feeling of deep gratitude for all who had participated in the celebration and who had done so much to make the occasion what it has been. He was proud of his priesthood, proud of his parish and his parishioners proud of his friends.

In addition to the purse from the parishioners, he was the recipient of a handsome gift from the ladies of the parish, a valuable gift from his altar boys, and many gifts from his fellow clergymen. The Church grounds were decorated with flags and banners, the altar adorned with flowers and the church bedecked with bunting by the ladies of the parish.

The visiting clergy were entertained at dinner and held an afternoon reception for the jubilarian.
