INMAN GATHERING AT HAMPTON

Providence smiled down with glorious sunshine and balmy breezes on Thursday, August 15th, 1929, as the Inman family of Prince Edward Island and many from the U. S. A. gathered in large numbers on the beautiful shore field and lawn of Mr. Arthur H. Inman, Hampton, P. E. I. to celebrate the 110th year of the landing of the first Inman settlers on Prince Edward Island. John Inman, his wife, and five sons, John, Robert, William, Mark, Thomas and one daughter, Mary, they first settled on the farm now owned by Mr. Ernest Cameron, Hampton, having sailed from Yorkshire, England and landing here in 1819. The country then being largely covered with forests and ways of cultivation and travel being very difficult they braved many hardships, but being a hardworking and industrious people they made a comfortable home for themselves and settled their sons on farms along this same shore near to the old homestead. They all married and raised families the descendants of whom today are scattered all over our fair island and in many parts of the world. The afternoon was pleasantly spent in renewing old acquaintances and making new ones, and the happy smiles and hearty handshakes of both old and young were evident that each and everyone were enjoying themselves to the fullest extent. All present were charmed with the beautiful shore nearby, the blue waters with small white breakers lapping gently on the rocks and red sand could not be resisted and many of the younger folks donned their bathing suits and enjoyed a refreshing dip. Underneath the beautiful shade trees on the lawn a bountiful table was spread with good things prepared by the ladies and needless to say all enjoyed the spread. After supper Judge Inman, Sumfraid, delivered an able speech telling about the first Inman gathering twenty years ago, this being the third celebration of its kind during that time, but as many present expressed their opinion that ten years between these gatherings was too long it was decided to hold the next one in two years time, a committee being appointed to look after affairs and so make it a still greater success. A prize was given to the oldest Inman lady present being won by Mrs. Elizabeth Harrington Nine Mile Creek, P. E. I. whose age is eighty nine years and who is still hale and hearty, able to do a considerable amount of housework, can sew and knit and braided a rug for the exhibition held in Charlottetown last week which took second prize, a similar one taking first prize in 1928. The prize given to the oldest Inman gentleman present was won by Mr. W. H. Inman, Crapaud, P. E. I. who is eighty four years of age and despite his years is still full of vigour and works his own farm. He enjoys auto riding very much and has motored over a great part of the island this summer. The Inman receiving the prize for having raised the largest family was Mrs. Mary A. Inman, Victoria, P. E. I., who is eighty six years of age and still going strong. She keeps up with all modern ideas of today and very interesting indeed are her stories of bygone days.
