Brilliant Performances Feature Yesterday's Play - Nova Scotians And Upper Canadians Lead Parade - Local Pair Spring Surprise In Doubles.

Meal weather favored the second day of one of the greatest Tournaments ever held in Eastern Canada. All the local stars in Mens Singles were eliminated but in each case they played excellent tennis and were highly complimented by their opponents. Gordon White won the first set from A. O. "Cliff" Wiswell but could not stand up against the steady and heavy play of the Maritime veteran. A. S. Dickson made a gallant stand against Nova Scotia's premier player Bevil Piers and showed a decided improvement in his game with the same versatile opponent who defeated him at Bridgewater N. S., in 1931. This strong local mixed team, Miss Eleanor Bourke and A. S. Dickson was defeated by the spectacular Mrs. Piers, teaming with his wife, in the longest and hardest fought match of the day. Alan Stewart teaming with Miss Henderson of St. John won over T. W. Thompson and Isabel McNeill of Halifax in a beautiful 38 game match. Another feature match was that of Messrs Donahoe and Christie of Halifax against Messrs Watt and Peters of Montreal which the latter team won in extra sets.

NEW YORK, Aug 10—Joe Jacobs, manager of Max Schmeling, former world heavyweight champion, has been reinstated by the New York State Athletic Commission yesterday after a brief suspension following Schmeling's defeat by Jack Sharkey. Jacobs was set down by the commission for shouting into a microphone at the close of the fight broadcast that he and his warrior had been "robbed". Suitable apologies and discussions at the commission brought an end to the punishment. Jacobs now is free to negotiate with Madison Square Garden for a match between Schmeling and Mickey Walker in September.

THE DOMINION RIFLE SHOOT

(By Jack Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Writer) CONNAUGHT RANGES, Ont., Aug. 10.—The weather man dumped his whole bag of tricks over the ranges here today, and nearly 800 marksmen had the time of their lives trying to keep up with him. In rapid succession, the sun shone, hid behind clouds, rain fell, stopped and fell again. The light was poor, good, bad and indifferent throughout the day; and finally, the range officers and marksmen worn out with trying to keep up with the vagaries of the weather, called it a day with one match and a couple of tie shoots still unfired. It was the most mixed-up day these ranges have seen for many a year. With shooting conditions so bad, all the two matches fired today reached a definite conclusion after some startling marksmanship. On Monday and Tuesday, every match fired finished with two or more riflemen tied for first place. Today, however, the string broke. Lt. Col. C. G. Gibson, of Hamilton, broke through with a perfect score at 1,000 yards to win the life-members match outright, and Lieutenant S. Johnson, Wayne, Alta., won the MacDonald Brier. To him went the honor of winning the first match of the meeting without a shoot-off for his double possible at 300 and 600 yards was too decisive for the rest of the field. Corporal L. S. Vaines, Montreal, was the victor in a rushing shoot-off with Lt. R. A. Sweet, Hamilton, for individual honors in the Bankers' match, fired yesterday. The two had scored 99 out of 100 in the actual match and fired 13 shots each today in the tie-shoot before Vaines scored a final bulls-eye to Sweet's inner.

2.15 Trot and Pace

This was the first race and had five starters. They got away on the second score with Billy Cope at the pole. Shortly after the three-quarter pole was passed in making the turn Marjorie M. cut in too quickly on Billy Cope and Billy made a break. The driver of Marjorie then pulled out to let Billy up, changed his mind and went on and won the heat, with Billy a good second and Lucky Lindy a very close third, Phil D. and Grandma fourth and fifth back about three lengths. The Judges called the drivers of Marjorie and Billy Cope to the stand, Jabble admitted that he had cut in and was placed second, Billy Cope being awarded the heat.

Olympic Boxing

OLYMPIC AUDITORIUM, Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 10.—Horace Gwynn, Toronto bantamweight, administered the first set-back to the strong Italian boxing contingent at the Olympic Games when he took a well earned decision tonight over Vito Mellis. (By Russell J. Newland, Associated Press Sports Writer.) OLYMPIC AUDITORIUM, Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 10.—Establishing some kind of a record by not listing a knockout in 27 battles the world's leading amateur boxer waded through another set of preliminaries today in their drive for Olympic championships. While the bouts have been fast and furious, the contestants have been so evenly matched that only a few knockdowns have been registered, let alone good old-fashioned kayoes. The net results of this afternoon's programme saw eight candidates eliminated including the game Louis Laviole, of Edmonton, Alta., who dropped a class decision to Roger Micholot, of France, in the middleweight division. Italy, winner of the team title four years ago, brought out another successful leather-thrower in Gino Rossi, who punched out an easy decision over Nikolas Mastoridis, of Greece, in the light-heavyweight class. The first United States reversal in the two days and nights of battling, came in the light-heavyweight division, John Miller, of Detroit, dropping the decision to the rugged Irishman, James J. Murphy. Germany had a winner in the 160-pound class, but a loser in the 175-pound ranks. Hans Bernlohi outpointed Albert Lowe of New Zealand, while David Carstens of South Africa thumped out a decision over Hans Berger in the light-heavyweight section. The Argentine contingent suffered a setback when Peter Jorgensen of Denmark eliminated Rafael Lang by a decision in the 175-pound preliminaries.

Bout Postponed
