

Attention Farmers Near Charlottetown

I have just returned from a Seed and Turnip trip to Boston, New York, Jersey and Long Island and a number of the farmers in this section always like to have me express my opinion on conditions.

As far as the State of Maine is concerned, they have plenty of potatoes to ship from now on. They will have to ship an average of 500 cars per day to bring their stock down to 5,000 cars by the first of May, and they feel that that is sufficient to have on hand at that time.

I see no reason to look for exorbitant prices but I can see no weakness in the market at the present time.

My recommendations are: haul your Potatoes the mild days; your turnips the cold days. This is not spring as yet; we will have our trucks available to meet you at the edge of town or at the ice. Do not kill your horses.

A lot of the farmers are worried about stem end browning in the majority of cases, it is not as serious as they think; and, if it does not appear for seed, we can find a market for it as No. 2 Table Stock at a good price. Contact with us and take advantage of this mild spell to move your Seed and Table Stock.

If there is going to be a real good kick in this Potato market, it might be late in May or early June. That is not advice; it is just my opinion.

MONTREAL, March 10 (CP) - There were 95 cattle, 10 sheep and lambs, 663 hogs and 889 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today. Prices on all classes of livestock were steady. Common to medium quality butcher cows and cubs \$5.75 to \$7.50. Canners and cubs \$4 to \$5.50. Common bulls \$6.50 to \$7.50. Veal calves were about steady quality considered. Prices ranged from \$9 to \$12.50. There were no tops. The bulk of calves were sold in mixed lots at \$10.50. Grassers Upp Can were \$6 to \$6.50. Culls and bucks were \$12.50 and sheep \$5.50 to \$7. Hogs were unchanged at \$15.30 to \$15.50 for B-1 dressed, and \$11.50 for B-1 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per cwt premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were mostly \$9 to \$9.25 live weight.

MONTREAL EXCHANGE

MONTREAL, March 10 (CP) - Issues drifted up or down within a narrow range today on the stock market. Minuses predominated in the light dealings.

General Steel Ware and Dominion Bridge worked fractionally higher in Industrials and Canadian Car and St. Lawrence Corporation were in arrears.

Montreal Power and Shawinigan were both easier in utilities but Canada Steamship preferred picked up a slight gain in carriers. International Nickel backed up in metals. In miscellaneous Imperial Tobacco dropped to a new low for the year. Others down in the group were National Breweries and Regent Knitting. Wilks was a winner. Total sales: 12,400 shares; Industrials, 5,100; Mines, 7,300.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, March 10 (CP) - The gold stocks suffered further losses in today's Toronto exchange market, declining 31 in the index to stand only half a point above the year. Hollinger's smaller shares posted a slight index loss and the industrials and western oils finished slightly on the upside. Turnover was 75,000 shares. The action was concentrated mainly in the golds. Molnyre was off 3-4 to 58 5-8, its low for the year. Hollinger weakened 15 cents to 47. Pioneer and Central Patricia, and San Antonio weakened 8 to 10 cents and losses of 3 to 5 cents were netted by Kerr-Addison, Wright - Hargreaves, MacLeod-Cockshutt, Monette, Perron and Prospectors Airways. Smaller declines were boarded by Aunor, Kirkland Lake, Cochenour Williams, Leitch and Teck Hughes. International Nickel weakened 1-4 to 31 3-4, its low for the year. Smelters dropped a minor fraction and losses of a cent or two were netted by Steep Rock and Noranda.

Brazilian, B.A. Oil, C.P.R., Fanny Farmer, General Steel Ware, Page Hersey and Greening Wire were all up narrowly at the close. Declines of a point or more were netted by Barker's Bread pfd, Canada Cement pfd, Consumers Gas and Dominion Foundry pfd. Bell Telephone turned heavy and closed down narrowly at 147 3-4 and small losses were boarded by Canadian Locomotive, Dominion Foundries common, Hinde Dauch and Loblaw B.

Highwood and Anglo-Canadian were slightly weaker in western oils.

NEW YORK, March 10 (AP) - Selling activities dominated the stock market's course today and various industrial issues fell to new lows for the last year and longer. Canadian stocks were irregular: a point, Canadian Pacific 1-8 and International Nickel 1-4 while Distillers Seagram lost 1-2. Dome Mines 3-8, and Molnyre 1-8. Unchanged were Brazilian Truacion and Imperial Oil.

On the day the Associated Press composite of 60 stocks recorded a net decline of 2 1/2 points at 35.0, the lowest level since March 31, 1928.

Transactions totalled 334,000 shares compared with 308,950 the previous day.

Closing fractions to as much as 3 1-2 points lower and in new low ground for an extended time were Du Pont, Westinghouse, Dow Chemical, Union Carbide, Allied Chemical, Eastman Kodak, Sears Roebuck, Standard Oil (N.J.), Texas Co and Liggett & Myers "B." Philip Morris dropped 5 1-4.

Moderate losers included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, and General Motors. Slightly ahead at the finish were Chrysler, United Aircraft, Sperry, Kennecott and Anaconda. Rails were narrow.

NEW YORK, March 10 (CP) - The Canadian dollar eased 1-16th of a cent in today's foreign exchange dealings closing at a discount of 11 3-4 per cent in relation to the United States dollar. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.99-9.91 per cent discount.) The pound sterling finished unchanged at \$4.04 as did all other leading foreign currencies.

C.N.R. SUPPORT LOAN

MONCTON, N. B., March 10 - Employees on the Atlantic region of the Canadian National Railways subscribed a total of \$666,550. to the Victory Loan, according to information released by W. U. Appleton, regional vice president and general manager here today. 6,966 employees contributed. In addition there was an increase of \$1,350 per month in subscriptions to War Savings Certificates.

In commenting upon the results Mr. Appleton said "Our employees are to be congratulated upon their patriotic effort and the splendid response they made to the appeal of the President of the Canadian National system, Mr. R. C. Vaughan, to get behind the Victory Loan campaign."

Canvassers were appointed from among railway personnel throughout the region and they solicited every employee. Subscriptions were by outright purchase and payroll deduction. Of employee organiza-

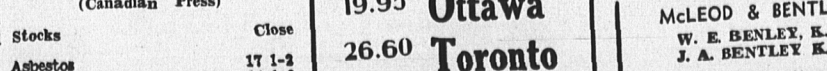
