Apocryphal to discussions at Moncton recently at the meeting of the Maritime Poultry Council re the utilization of nearby markets, Mr. D. J. Gillis, Director of Agriculture for Newfoundland, will meet the Senior Poultry Marketing Inspectors from the Maritime Provinces together with the Maritime Provincial Poultry Inspectors at Truro on March 13th and 14th. Mr. Gillis will be prepared to discuss the whole program of foundation stock, commercial started chicks or laying stock for Newfoundland at that time. The supplying of such poultry to Newfoundland offers an excellent opportunity for local flock owners to get in on this remunerative business. Already one progressive flock owner, Mr. J. J. MacLean, has laid a contract with a Newfoundland party and has secured a deposit of \$900 with the order. It is hoped that other particulars will be at hand. If possible, take advantage of such opportunities.

Hatchability this year is definitely better than last year, however, some flocks are showing a tendency to poor hatchability. An Inspector of the Poultry Services was sent out to investigate feeding practices and general management of these flocks and in his reports, amongst other poor practices, is noticed excessive use of steel wool. Such a practice is not advisable. Keep the nests and floors of the poultry clean and free from steel wool. Make every effort to finish such chickens often, thus avoiding any cleaning of eggs.

In view of the fact that all low hatchability eggs were found where eggs had been cleaned by steel wool, we ask flock owners to refrain from cleaning hatching eggs with steel wool.

The verdict of public opinion is that no baby chicks should be wasted this year.

Contracts for the export of dressed poultry up to 30,000,000 pounds have been arranged for 1945. Ceiling or near ceiling prices are assured for Grades A and B, weighing two pounds and over, passing inspection and available in carlots. Get busy and plan upon raising an extra 100 to 500 chicks for meat purposes. The world needs meat. There is an urgent need of dressed poultry for war food. Flock owners are asked to realize the necessity of taking every means of making available for war food as large a tonnage of dressed poultry as possible.

Hatcheries throughout the country have cockerels for sale. Such cockerels can be purchased at a much less cost than mixed chicks. Grab them whilst you can. Get into the dressed poultry game. Make every effort to finish such cockerels properly. You are assured a good profitable price for your finished product. Never before has the price outlook been so gratifying.

Remember! Every chicken that can be marketed, as meat in 1945 is needed.

**Says Newfoundland Was Maligned In Medical Survey**

(By The Canadian Press)

TORONTO, March 7.—Sir John Puddister, commissioner for public health and welfare in the British commission ruling Newfoundland, said in an interview last night that Canadians are "always maligning Newfoundland and you can't have it in Confederation if you go on like that."

He said findings of a survey made by 11 medical experts, four Canadians, one English and six from the United States, were "unfair."

The experts reported public health on the island "is far from satisfactory" and referred to the "high incidence of disease and faults in training of the country."

"I don't see any difference in the people of Newfoundland and those in Toronto," he said.

The worst areas were picked in order to find out what was the result of 10 years living on relief from 1931 to 1941. Sir John said, and added "the majority of the people of Newfoundland get an adequate diet."

**Canadian Trained Pathologist Dead**

DEPOUT, MIDDLESEX, ENG., March 7.—(CP Cable)—Dr. Thomas Henry Belt, 43, distinguished pathologist who received his early training in Canada where he won recognition, was found dead today in an automobile.

Cause of death was not known tonight and the inquest date has not been fixed. At the time of his death Dr. Belt was consultant anatomist at the Emergency Pathological Service Laboratories, at nearby Watford.

Dr. Belt came to England from Canada in 1937 and joined the staff of the British Post-Graduate Medical School at Hammersmith Hospital, London, as senior assistant in morbid anatomy. Before leaving there three years ago he made several important contributions, including discovery of a previously unknown form of lung disease, which has been called "Belt's Disease."

**Military Papers Checked At Montreal**

MONTREAL, March 7.—(CP) —For the first time since the start of the war, Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Army Provost Corps men today checked the military papers of all males of military age at Montreal railway stations, in an intensified drive for army deserters.

Hundreds of persons were stopped during the day, as passengers from incoming and outgoing trains were checked. Police said the check-up caused only momentary delay to travelers.

**DEVELOP JAMAICA FARMS**

LONDON.—(CP) —The Colonial office has announced a grant of \$211,000 (about \$2,300,000) toward establishment of 10 agricultural training centres in Jamaica. The aim is to reorganize and develop Jamaican agriculture.

**Missing in Action**

**Acquitted In Shooting Of Trapped Man**

KUNMING, March 7.—(AP) —A 21-year-old States Air Force officer, whose two shots from his service pistol ended the agonized screaming of a 20-year-old sergeant, was hopelessly trapped in a flaming plane, has been acquitted of a charge of voluntary manslaughter.

(Neither his name nor the victim's was given in this dispatch. Presumably censorship withheld them.)

It was reported that the decision hinged on reasonable doubt as to whether death was caused by the shots or burning, and on the degree of provocation.

The sergeant, witness in this story of the shooting last Jan. 18:

Six men tried to pull the still-conscious gunner free. There was no time to cut away the metal and physicians could not get into position to amputate his legs.

His screams, followed by the roar of the flames. An engineering officer at the base, drawing his revolver, exclaimed "I am going to shoot him. I can't stand hearing him scream."

He fired one shot into the ground to see if the pistol functioned. The aim wavered and turned away saying "I can't do it."

"Don't shoot me. Pull me out of here. I'm screaming the gunner."

The trapped man quieted. He gasped at the colonel. Then his mud-stained and drenched and his eyes turned away. Two shots were fired. The sergeant's hand almost indistinguishable above the exploding 50-caliber bullet.

Rather than base his case on a contention that the shooting was an act of mercy, defence counsel emphasized that the defendant had acted irrationally under great emotional strain.

**Favors Continuing Air Training Plan**

LONDON, March 8.—(CP Cable) —The British Commonwealth Air Training Plan had a far-reaching effect on the war effort and should be continued after the war, Mrs. Christopher York, Conservative member for Ripon, said today in the House of Commons.

The plan, carried out mainly in Canada, is scheduled to lapse this month.

"All operational training should take place in the wider stretches of country in the Empire," Major York said, "and it should be an interchange of stations between the United Kingdom, the Dominions and the Colonies."

"The result of this integration and co-ordination must be to strengthen the ties of Empire and help security and also Empire civil aviation," he added. "We should bend the stern necessities of war to wider and more permanent aspects to help in the duty of guiding the world with peace and freedom-loving nations."
