The charges for spinning are 27c a pound for single and 30c a pound for doubled and twisted. Dyeing costs 25c a pound extra.

The charges for weaving blankets are \$2.25 each laundered and \$2.50 each laundered and napped.

Wool for spinning and weaving must be washed and all dirt and burrs picked out.

We are buying wool daily, washed and unwashed, and are paying the highest market prices. Freight is paid on 100 pounds of washed wool for custom work only.
