### Railway Men Meet At M'tl Conference

MONTREAL, Que., June 12 — Delegates from all parts of the Canadian National Railway system in Canada and the United States, representing 18,000 maintenance of way workers meeting in Montreal yesterday heard S.W. Westwood, vice president, research and development, say that the problem of operating and maintaining a railway was "dynamic not static" and commended to them the scientific and engineering point of view. "We should be keenly alert," he said, "to the changing content and form of railroading, to the fact that old methods are replaced by new, and that the old materials give place to better. We have the scope, even greater changes in the future than we have experienced in the past. In your field of activity I commend to you the scientific and engineering point of view. With access to the best information with our own inventive ingenuity, and with co-operative action, the Canadian National will continue to be in the forefront."

Attending the 15th annual meeting of the system committee, Union Management Co-operation movement, Maintenance of Way Department, the men were meeting with representatives of the management to discuss mutual problems regarding a department study which required the expenditure last year of \$70,000,000 on the 24,000 miles of lines.

Highway Competition  
Speaking of highway competition, Mr. Fairweather said that the first factor in the problems was informed public opinion. The railway had made an intensive study of it and a new economic approach was being developed. The common sense expressions of the railway never failed to carry conviction with the sensibly minded, he said. The public must be convinced that the problem was a national one, which must be dealt with nationally.

F. Fjoldal, Detroit, president, American Railway Brotherhood of maintenance of way employees, formerly a CNR employee brought the greetings of E. E. Millman, Detroit, grand president, who was unable to be present. There was no problem the railroads could not solve, Mr. Fjoldal said. If they brought to peace the same spirit that resulted in such splendid accomplishments in the past, the counterpart to conflict in any industry was co-operation and he regretted that the co-operative movement had not yet been extended to all industries. "Unless we find some way of co-operating, not only in industry but in our wide world affairs it will not be well with the world."

## Canada Can Ship More Meat To The Hungry If We Eat Only What We Need — Turn In Coupons



Even under rationing Canadians are eating more meat than before the war. Less meat eaten by Canadians would mean more for children like these. Two are shown making a personal gift of meat by donating some of their own meat ration coupons. Valid meat ration coupons or tokens which the public turn in to Local Ration Boards or give to authorized custodians go to purchase extra meat for shipment abroad.

As long as valid coupons remain in the hands of consumers, meat has to be retained in Canada to honour them. When coupons are donated, an equivalent amount of meat is freed and added to overseas shipments. Careful cooking, smaller servings, the elimination of all waste will enable Canadians to contribute more valid meat coupons toward feeding the hungry people who face famine in Europe and the Far East.
