—CITY COUNCIL.—At the meeting of the newly elected Mayor and Council Monday evening, the various committees and officers were appointed. The only changes in the list of officers is George W. Robinson, Assessor, in place of Edward H. Murphy; Douglas Gordon, Auditor in place of Frank Arnett. W. T. Mathieson was appointed Fire Chief, with F. H. Farrant, Assistant. These appointments being made owing to the resignation of Chief Johnson. Joseph Hickey was appointed engineer of the steamer Beaver. The annual vote of ten dollars per man to the fire department was passed. The members of the School Board waited upon the Council, asking for an additional grant of \$1,000 for school purposes. The meeting adjourned till Friday night.

—BOARD OF TRADE.—The Council of Summerside Board of Trade held a special meeting last night to take into consideration the withdrawal of the Cascapedia, from the Montreal Island service. The matter was discussed at some length and the secretary was instructed to wire the company and ascertain if possible their reasons for withdrawal and if anything could be done to induce them to reconsider their decision. A telegram was also ordered to be sent to the Montreal Board of Trade urging upon them to use their best efforts to have this service continued for this year at least, owing to the congestion on the railway. The secretary was also instructed to confer with the Charlottetown Board, on the subject and a committee was appointed to write other steamship lines with a view to taking up the services if the decision to withdraw the Cascapedia is final.—C.
