U.S. MARINES COME TO AID OF POLICEMEN

Halifax Officer Badly Beaten By Thugs—Chinaman Knocked Unconscious When He Attempted To Protect Girl.

HALIFAX, June 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—Arthur Fisher, who served seven years in penitentiary for shooting a man in Cobalt, Ontario, was again being uncertain until three United States marines stepped into a fray and assisted a badly beaten policeman. As a result of his evening's activities, Fisher has four charges against him. Three are in connection with assault, on Miss M. Smith, Wong Ling, and police officer Sylvester Brown. The fourth was laid when a watch, stolen from A. P. Barnstead's jewelry store, was found in his pocket.

He attracted attention on Barrington Street, when he struck Miss Smith. Several bystanders did not interfere, but a Chinaman ventured to assist the girl and was felled by a blow on the jaw. Fisher disappeared, and Wong Ling sought the police. Officer Brown found Fisher on Göttingen Street. He attempted to arrest him, but Joe Fisher, a brother of Arthur, and John Alkenhead took up the cause of the wanted man.

The three had given the policeman a severe beating when United States Marines from the cutter Tampa arrived on the scene. Joe Fisher and Alkenhead are charged with assaulting a police officer.

BEECH HILL FARM LOSS \$150,000

Three Large Barns Destroyed, But Famous Herd of Guernseys Saved.

PRINCETOWN, N. S., June 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—The largest herd of accredited Guernseys in Canada, including many prize-winning cattle of international fame, was saved today when fire destroyed three large barns of Beech Hill Farm with a loss estimated at \$150,000.

Former estate of the late F. W. Swindells, who successfully combined the activities of Nova Scotia farmer and New England business executive, Beech Hill Farm was considered a model. Mr. Swindells came to his wife's home at Princetown in search of health seven years ago and built the plant which was to become one of the agricultural show places of Eastern Canada. After his death last September, the farm was purchased by Thomas Nowlan of Moncton, N. B. Tonight only the fine residence

CAR ACCIDENT LAST NIGHT

Ellsworth Diamond Seriously Injured When Auto Hits Post On Euston St.

A serious car accident occurred last night about 12:30 when a Chevrolet sedan, owned by Tom Hunter, and driven by Robert Bradley, crashed into a lamp post near the corner of Euston and School Streets.

The car was proceeding along at an alleged moderate rate of speed, when Ellsworth Diamond, an occupant of the back seat of the car is said to have been standing with his hands resting on the front seat. The driver glanced back, and the next instant the car struck the post.

Ellsworth Diamond was the more seriously hurt and was rushed to the P. E. I. Hospital where his injuries were examined. He was found to be suffering from a fractured skull and minor cuts and bruises about the face.

The driver of the car, Robert Bradley received no injuries. Charlie Bradley suffered a bruised leg while Garfield Taylor got off comparatively free.

There were two young girls in the car at the time of the accident who escaped injury.

The car was badly damaged, having the right hand fender demolished, headlights and windshield smashed, and the axle and steering wheel broken.

At time of going to press Mr. Diamond was still unconscious.

Will Appeal Deportation Of Alleged "Reds"

HALIFAX, June 20.—Having failed in three courts, Lionel A. Ryan, Halifax lawyer, tonight announced he would go to the Supreme Court of Canada in an effort to secure freedom for eight alleged Communists who have been held in the immigration detention quarters here for more than a month.

Mr. Ryan was retained by the Canadian Labor Defence League. He defended the prisoners at an immigration tribunal after they were arrested in various Canadian cities and brought to Halifax by Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The eight were sentenced to be deported, and he stayed the order by starting habeas corpus proceedings before Mr. Justice E. W. F. Carroll, whose decision in dismissing the application was sustained by the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. It is an appeal from this decision that Mr. Ryan will take to the higher court. An appeal from the deportation order has been made to the Minister of Immigration.

Cargo Returned

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 20.—The British registered vessel Cadet of Weymouth, Nova Scotia, seized by the coast guard last January, left for St. Pierre today with its cargo of 1,100 sacks of liquor. The vessel was freed by federal court order, the court contending the government failed to show the Cadet was seized within the 12-mile limit. A libel for forfeiture was dismissed and the liquor returned. A coast guard vessel escorted the Cadet to a point beyond the 12-mile limit.

6 Yr. Old Girl Missing, Infant Brother Found

KENTVILLE, N. S., June 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—Fifty men were in the woods near Loon Lake tonight, searching for Leota Kinsman, aged six, who has been missing since nine o'clock this morning. Accompanied by her brother, George, aged 3, the little girl wandered away from the home of her grandfather, Raymond Jonnes, about three miles from the lake. Their mother, Mrs. Craig Kinsman, missed them shortly after they left the house but she was unable to trace them.

Mayor G. W. Lyons of Kentville called for volunteers, and early tonight a party led by Royal Canadian Mounted Police found the boy asleep under some brush at the edge of the lake. He was exhausted and bitten by insects, but will recover. At midnight they had found no trace of the girl.

Baby Found Floating In Pond, Will Live

DARTMOUTH, N. S., June 20.—Lawrence DeWolfe, aged three fell into a large pond here today. He floated for 15 minutes before he was rescued by Earl Wambolt, a school boy. The child appeared lifeless when taken from the water, but after working on him for 20 minutes, Dr. H. I. Glennister revived him and expressed the opinion that if he had not been stunned he would have drowned.

Granted Bail Pending Appeal

TORONTO, June 20.—(By The Canadian Press)—Pending his appeal to a higher court, James Sinclair, Canadian Pacific railway engineer of Belleville, was granted freedom today on \$5,000 bail. He was sentenced to three months in the Ontario Reformatory on a charge of criminal negligence arising out of his train killing four persons at a crossing. Chief Justice Rose set the bail at Osgoode Hall today.

Death List Is Now 27

MONTREAL, June 20.—(By The Canadian Press)—The body of Arthur Briggs, steel worker, today was raised from the dry dock of Canadian Vickers, Limited, bringing the number of bodies taken from the scene of last Friday's disastrous explosions to 23. In addition two men died in hospital over the week end. The complete death list with 27 names, includes fire chief Raoul Gauthiers and J. Rock, workman, whose bodies are still missing.

CAN. MEDICAL ASSN. MEETING IN TORONTO

Health Insurance and Cancer Research Discussed at Yesterday's Sessions.

TORONTO, June 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—Health insurance and cancer research occupied most of today's meeting of the council of the Canadian Medical Association which is holding its 63rd annual convention here in conjunction with the 52nd annual meeting of the Ontario Medical Association. A committee on the cancer problem headed by Dr. J. S. McEachern of Calgary, reported today in favor of establishing a department of clinical research under auspices of the Canadian Medical Association. This department, the report suggested should contain a subdivision for cancer research organized with a central committee having under its jurisdiction provincial committees which, in turn, would be responsible for local hospital cancer committees. This scheme would bring under unified control efforts now under way in cancer research by five Canadian provinces. Local committees would be established in all hospitals containing more than 100 beds. These local committees would supply to the provincial committees full case histories of all cancer patients admitted to their wards. The provincial committees would keep
