SIR:—You are aware, no doubt, that a new Election for East Queen's has been ordered for 20th March.  
Time will not permit me to make a personal canvass, nor will I be able to hold many meetings, but have selected a few central places and must depend on the active work of the friends of our party in every poll. I again urge upon our friends to keep within lawful bounds, using no liquor nor money, but to put forth every legitimate effort for the success of Liberalism which is clearly the best for this country.
