Dispute Arises Over Can. Participation In World Title Series

LONDON, Nov. 26 — (CP Cable) — The British hockey sources said today a situation dispute has arisen between the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the International Ice Hockey Association over Canadian participation in the world championship series scheduled to be held at Prague Feb. 15-22, 1947.

The sources said that the I.I.H.A. has summoned here that the C.A.H.A. has in mind Winnipeg Monarchs, last season's Canadian Junior Champions and Memorial Cup winner, but it is pointed out that many of the players are not with the club this season.

The series is to be held under the direction of the International Ice Hockey Federation and, according to the authoritative sources, gives little chance to Dr. Hardy's organization to name the Canadian representative.

"I can tell you right now," one highly-placed informant, told the Canadian Press, "that if a Canadian team is entered for the championships, it must be a C.A.H.A. club. Any other club will not be accepted."

Coach Of White Sox Dismissed

CHICAGO, Nov. 26 — (Prelude to a promised 1947 shake-up of the Chicago White Sox was today's dismissal by Manager Ted Lyons of Coach George (Mule) Haas, hold-over from the regime of Jimmy Dykes whom Lyons succeeded as pilot last season.

The Red Handers played 50 games and won all but three, the losses being in exhibition matches.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26 — (CP) — As the bright afternoon sun slanted across the polo grounds, Elmer Kenneth (The Toe) Strong stood in the shadow of the goalposts that had been an easy target through his 24 football seasons and celebrated a United States Thanksgiving day come four days early. It was Sunday, Nov. 24, and to him admirers brought a glossy new \$2,000 automobile, \$2,000 in war bonds, a wrist watch, luggage and silverware, tokens of appreciation for the man who had scored 308 points with his accurate foot, 11 behind ex-teenmate Ward Cuff's all-time mark. He remembered that he was 40, as old as any man should be in football, and he made a taut little speech of thanks on this "Ken Strong Day" at the polo grounds, this premature Thanksgiving.

Billy The Kid Still Leading Scoring Race

MONTREAL, Nov. 26 — National Hockey League statistics released today showed Detroit Red Wings' Billy Taylor top man in the individual scoring race for the fifth consecutive week.

Taylor has accumulated 22 points made up of seven goals and 15 assists. Maurice Richard and Syd Abel of Detroit and Ted Kennedy of Toronto Maple Leafs are tied for the third slot with 16 points each. Abel has netted 10 goals and picked up six assists and Kennedy has notched eight counters and helped on eight more.

Richard with 11 goals leads the league's goal-getters while Abel of Detroit and Tony Leswick of New York Rangers have stink 10 goals each and share the runner-up spot. Taylor with 15 assists is the loop's leading playmaker.

Toronto's Turk Broda and Boston Bruins' Frankie Brimsek are tied for the league's goalkeeper honors. Both net custodians have allowed 34 goals to slip past them in 14 games and both have registered two shutouts apiece to head that department too.

Kenny Reardon, Canadiens' aggressive defenceman, heads the cooler customers with 31 minutes spent in the penalty box.

Toronto's hustling Maple Leafs are perched atop the league standings with 19 points as a result of eight wins, three ties and three losses. Canadiens are in second place with 17 points and Detroit third with 16.

Two Boxers Suspended

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 26 — (AP) — The Miami Boxing Commission fined Eddie (Red) Cameron, Miami heavyweight, and Jerry Berthaume, Montreal heavy 1800 each last night and suspended them for the rest of 1946 for "unsportsmanlike action in the ring."

Referee Eddie Coachman stopped their scheduled 10-round fight midway in the fifth round and ruled it "no contest." Coachman said butting and kicking by both fighters caused him to take such action.

After six policemen had cleared the ring and escorted both fighters to their dressing rooms, Coachman said: "Berthaume butted Red over the eye and Red started using his head. I broke them and said I'd throw them both out if they didn't stop it. They started all over again, so I stopped it."
