Rioting Flares In Quebec Strike

SOREL, Que., May 27—(CP)—Rioting flared in this strike-harassed town today, and three manufacturing plants and six other buildings were damaged before order was restored.

The riot precipitated by ill-feeling between strikers and strike-breakers, raged unchecked for an hour as mobs, hurling stones and other weapons and tearing down sections of buildings, caused damage estimated at \$20,000.

No one was injured; there was no hand-to-hand fighting between the factions. There were no arrests as the town's police force was too small to cope with the rioters, who had dispersed before provincial police sped into town in answer to emergency appeals.

Claims Miners Have Violated Agreement

SYDNEY, N. S., May 27—(CP)—Stoppage of work by miners at the government-operated Inverness colliery was "violation of the United Mine Workers' contract" with the government, Mines Minister Michael Dwyer said here tonight.

"The government will take no action under the circumstances while the mine is idle," the Nova Scotia Minister of Mines said. He believed the U.M.W. District Executive would not stand behind the Inverness strike and the men would soon be "back to work."

Approximately 350 Inverness miners refused to work today, demanding a change in the system of work distribution. The U.M.W. contract with the government states the Union will not call a strike until negotiations with operating companies have failed. The Inverness strike began before any negotiations were held, it was stated.

Record Tourist Year Expected In Maritimes

MONCTON, N. B., May 27—From a preliminary survey of the prospects for the tourist season of 1937, it would appear that there will be a record tourist travel to the Maritime Provinces this season, declared M. F. Tompkins, Traffic Manager of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways, here.

These predictions, Mr. Tompkins said, are based on results at southern resorts and the increased travel to the British West Indies on cruise liners of the Canadian National Steamships during the past winter season. With the improvement in the economic situation that has taken place more funds seem to be available for holiday travel.

Canada's Atlantic provinces, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, have always been noted for their scenic beauties and fishing possibilities but as a result of the more extensive advertising of their vacation attractions being carried on by tourist agencies, governmental and local, along with the transportation companies, their vacation attractions are becoming better known. Mr. Tompkins stated. A considerable increase in the number of visitors from Upper Canadian provinces has been noted during the past few seasons, he remarked.

An added feature in the matter of travel comfort to the Maritimes this season, Mr. Tompkins said, is the introduction of air-conditioning on trains serving Eastern Canada. The Ocean Limited operating between Montreal and Halifax is equipped with air-conditioned compartment-observation-living and sleeping cars, thus greatly adding to the pleasure of passengers en route to spend a vacation in these summer holiday lands by the sea.

A record tourist travel is also anticipated to the Gaspé Peninsula this season, he concluded, this part of the vacation country of Eastern Canada attracting greater numbers of tourists each season.

WORLD GOLD SITUATION BEFORE PARLEY

South African Delegates Claim Managed Cause of Trade Instability.

LONDON, May 27—(CP cable)—The world gold situation, it is understood, has been brought before the Imperial Conference by South African delegates.

They were reported tonight to have stressed that trade instability was caused by managed currencies.

No official confirmation was forthcoming but it was believed the question will be referred to the Conference's Economic Committee for thorough examination by experts.

South Africa, with Canada, is a leading producer of gold.

The Conference postponed its major discussions this afternoon while awaiting the change-over in the British Government.

After the morning session at which tributes to Baldwin's work for the Empire were paid, the only session held was a meeting of the Shipping Committee which again considered the question of competition by United States-owned shipping in the Tasman Sea between Australia and New Zealand. No decisions were taken.

Prime Minister MacKenzie King of Canada, with the other dominion premiers and Sir Zahirullah Khan on behalf of India, expressed regret that Baldwin's long career as Prime Minister had reached its end and praised his work in several Imperial Conferences.

Reference was made to the approaching retirement of Ramsay MacDonald, who also has presided over Imperial gatherings.

The Conference opened discussion on Empire trade matters, with statements by Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, Finance Minister Dunning of Canada and others.

Delegates were understood to view favorably a project toward coordination of armaments by establishing uniform specifications. For example, the plan would make New Zealand shells fit Canadian guns or United Kingdom replacement parts suitable for South African tanks.

C.N.R. Crop Report

WINNIPEG, Man., May 27—High winds with some soil drifting in Southern Saskatchewan and Alberta followed by scattered rainfall in central and northern sections of all three provinces, featured crop news during the past week. Damage from soil drifting ranged from light to fairly severe on the lighter soil types in those areas lacking early spring precipitation. Immediate and regular rains are required in these southern areas if crops are to recover and make satisfactory progress. Rainfall of the past two days has been heaviest in Central and Eastern Manitoba with scattered precipitation reported across the park belt to Edmonton. Soil drifting damage is reported on the Lewvan, Lampman, Avonlea, Gravelbourg subdivisions of Saskatchewan and in mine instances even in more northerly sections, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture, Canadian National Railways.

Wheat seeding in Manitoba is practically complete with little damage reported from any source anywhere. High winds which threatened soil drifting in some areas were discounted by rains immediately following in southwest sections. Frost, Portage to Dauphin and westerly wheat seeding is practically completed with plenty of moisture and good growth. Conditions are favorable. Along the Lewvan, Lampman, Avonlea, Gravelbourg, Central Butte, Riverhurst, Bengough subdivisions a man might put a canoe in some central reservoir such as Lake Winnipeg and travel East to the Atlantic, West to the Pacific North to the Arctic, Northeast to Hudson Bay or South to the Gulf of Mexico with no more land travel than an occasional portage.

Used Animated Map In Presidential Address

TORONTO, May 27—(CP)—President Lawrence J. Burpee of the Royal Society of Canada delivered a novel presidential address using an animated map, working on the principle of the animated cartoon, and letting quoted words from narratives of explorers tell the story of Canada's discovery and early exploration.

Mr. Burpee, Canadian Secretary of the International Joint Commission at Ottawa, began his talk with the voyages of Leif Erickson and Thorfinn Karlsefni, the early Norse adventurers, while the map on the screen kept pace with his words.

He stressed the importance of the country's vast waterways in its exploration, declaring it had been proved repeatedly by exper-

divisions of Saskatchewan wheat seeding is completed and work with coarse grains has been held up awaiting rain. Weather has been cool with strong winds and a few light showers but these have not been sufficient to be of much benefit. Land is quite dry and damage from soil drifting is apparent. Early own fields are green but showing patchy.

From Yorkton west through the Watrous, Dodsland, Biggar, Rose-town, Erore subdivisions weather has varied over this great territory from cool with high winds to dust blowing at some points. Seeding is practically completed and early sown grain is showing up well. There has been no effort on the part of farmers to advance coarse grain seeding as rain is badly needed.

From all points constituting the Prince Albert division come reports of high winds followed by showers which offset any damage therefrom. Splendid growth has been shown by early sown grains and seeding is practically completed. Moisture is sufficient for present growth requirements and farmers in this territory are now busy breaking land.

Along the Drumheller, Oyen, Stettler, Three Hills, Red Deer subdivisions of Alberta weather has been cloudy with heavy winds and light scattered showers. Seed has been blown out at some points and rain is required. Grasshopper poison bait mixing stations have been established at some points and poison bait is ready for use when required.

From North Central Alberta come reports of warm dry weather with moderately strong winds which moved soil on lighter lands. All grain seeding is now practically completed and moisture condi-

tions are good.

All points in the Grande Prairie and Peace River territories report wheat seeding completed and grain showing above ground. Coarse grain work is rapidly drawing to a close and with cool showery weather there is ample moisture for satisfactory growth.
