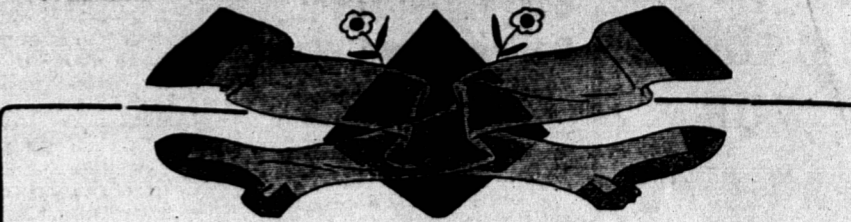
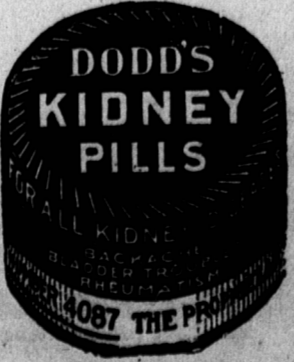

It has just been announced that the Canadian Marconi Company has purchased a site of 125,000 square feet of land in the Town of Mount Royal, P.Q., where work on the erection of a new Marconi manufacturing plant has already been started. Plans for the new building were prepared by Ross & MacDonald, well-known Montreal architects, and the construction work is in the capable hands of the Foundation Company Limited, who plan to have the new structure completed and ready for occupancy in April. Anticipating the need for still further growth in the future, the plant is being so constructed as to permit still greater expansion as the need arises. It is stated that this new factory, the future home of Marconi Radio, will rank with the finest Radio Manufacturing Plants on the continent. The type of equipment to be installed will be the latest known to the radio manufacturing field. In all, 45,000 square feet of manufacturing space will be available and no single detail will be lacking to make possible the efficient production of the latest achievements of Marconi Radio engineers. It is felt that the location of the new plant in the Town of Mount Royal will offer strategic advantages, inasmuch as it borders Montreal, where the head offices of the Canadian Marconi Company are situated in the Marconi Building. In addition it provides excellent rail shipping facilities at its very door. No definite announcement has been made concerning the new Marconi models to be introduced during 1930, but it is rumored that they will embrace many desirable features far in advance of anything that has heretofore made its appearance in the Canadian Radio Field.
