### THE BATTLE OF SANTIAGO.

The other day Admiral Schley in giving testimony before the Naval Board of Inquiry told in a clear, straightforward manner the story of the battle of Santiago and the destruction of Cervara's fleet. The story of that eventful day has never been better told. Admiral Sampson had gone eastward with the New York, having previously signalled an order to pay no attention to the movements of the flagship, and was out of sight when the battle began. When the Spanish fleet appeared Schley's first order to the commander of his ship, the Brooklyn, was to "go right for them." This was followed by the signal to the other ships to "close in for action." As to the famous "loop" Schley says it was Capt Cook of the Brooklyn who gave the order to turn, but he himself would have given the order a second later had it not been given by his captain. He denies that there was any danger of colliding with the Texas, and affirms that the two ships were never nearer than six hundred yards of each other. He also denies having said "Damn the Texas."

It was 9.35 o'clock in the morning when the Spanish fleet came out of the harbor. It was not till 2.23 p. m. that Admiral Sampson on the New York appeared on the scene. To him Schley reported the events of the day and how the Spanish ships had been encountered and destroyed. The story of the fight as told by Admiral Schley, taken in connection with the testimony previously given by those engaged in the action, makes it clear that it was fought and the victory won wholly under the direction of Schley. He has also thoroughly vindicated his course from the time he was entrusted with the command of the Flying Squadron down to the battle of Santiago.

We doubt not that as the result of the inquiry the American people will be convinced that the victor of Santiago has been cruelly maligned and slandered, and that a persistent effort has been made by Admiral Sampson to deprive Schley of the honors justly due him. No doubt had Admiral Sampson been present and in command on the eventful day the Spanish fleet would have been destroyed, perhaps as quickly, and as thoroughly as it was effected under Schley's command, but Sampson was not there until the fight was over. Sampson acted a most ungenerous part in claiming too much for himself and in lending his countenance and support to Schley's detractors. We doubt not that the Board of Inquiry will vindicate Admiral Schley, and that history will set him in his true light before the American people and the world.
